

LATROBE TOWN CENTRE REVIEW

Latrobe is a friendly and welcoming community recognised for its rural character, attractively built environment, beautiful natural surroundings, and high quality of life for its residents. Latrobe Council is reviewing the overall operation of the Latrobe Town Centre, limited to the area bounded by Cotton Street, Victor Street, Hicks Lane, and Hamilton Street, and are seeking your thoughts on how you see this space going forward. Council has engaged urban design firm, Studio GL, to consider enhancements for the central business district that are reflective of the unique identity and community of Latrobe. Key objectives include -

- investigating opportunities for additional commercial development and tourist accommodation,
- evaluating traffic flow and pedestrian accessibility along Gilbert Street, and
- proposing effective traffic management solutions.

The project will also address the town's parking situation, seeking to develop feasible solutions for future car parking while enhancing urban amenities. Public spaces like Station Square and Kings Park will be reviewed for potential improvements and better connectivity to



the coastal pathway along River Road and the Wild Mersey Mountain Bike Trailhead at the Warrawee Conservation Area. Overall the project seeks to develop a plan to guide future growth and development in the central business district.

Studio GL will be spending two days in Latrobe talking, discussing, generating ideas, and sharing them with you for your feedback, maximising the desirable outcomes in a targeted timeframe. This consultation will commence with a Community Drop-In Session on Thursday, 16 November from 12:30 pm until 2:30 pm at Station Square, Gilbert Street,

16 November from 10:00 am until

12:00 pm and the other on Friday, 17 November from 5:00 pm until 7:00 pm. Both sessions will be held in the Latrobe Memorial Hall, Gilbert Street, Latrobe. If you can't make it to any of these community consultation sessions, there is yet another option.

PORT SORELL ROUNDABOUT

The detailed design of improvements to the roundabout at the junction of Port Sorell Main Road, Alexander Street, and Parker Ford Road is currently underway. Several updates have been included in the redesign:

- A 2.5m wide shared footpath and new pavement on the Port Sorell Main Road/Alexander Street corner.
- A 2.5m wide shared footpath on the Alexander Street/Wilmot Street corner.
- A blister kerb and 1.5m wide footpath on the Wilmot Street/Parkers Ford Road corner.
- Splitter islands on all approaches, to shelter pedestrians/cyclists when crossing.
- A new bus shelter and perforated bin enclosure on an existing slab on the south side of Port Sorell Main Road.

The design of the bus shelter is the same as the one used on Poyston Drive at the Woolworths Shopping complex. This design has been selected due to specific site requirements leading up to the roundabout

EXPLORING THE BAKERS SCENIC CHALLENGE: AN EQUINE ADVENTURE

The Tasmanian Equine Endurance Riders Association (TEERA) has introduced the Bakers Scenic Challenge to its calendar, drawing nearly 100 horse riders from around the state. This event near Bakers Beach on 16 September offered three courses: a 12km introductory, a 40km intermediate, and an 80km endurance route. Riders faced natural bush terrain and challenging hills along the Asbestos Range.

Despite challenging weather - windy and overcast - riders embraced the new challenge. They may not have been greeted by scenic hilltop views but their enthusiasm remained undampened. Riders look forward to returning next year. Seventeen juniors joined the adventure, including locals Emerald Rigby, Zavannah Brownrigg, Kiana Nutting, Taylor Skirving, Lauren Rattray, Kenzie Rattray, Sophia Stansbie, Matilda Richards, and Ada Dare. Some completed their first endurance ride, marking a promising future for the sport.

Winners emerged in fierce competition, with Anita Hutchins on Van Dieman Sanity leading the 80km category, Deb Wyllie on Beer Street Aslan TB taking the Middleweight, Carolyn Foley-Jones on Highland View Mustang Sally dominating Heavyweight, and Dylan Stevens on Foley-Jones JJ securing the first Junior prize.

The event's success was made possible by support from local organisations, property owners, sponsors, radio checkpoint providers, and a dedicated team of volunteers.

The Bakers Scenic Challenge has firmly established itself as an exciting addition to Tasmania's equine endurance scene, promising more thrills and adventure in the years ahead.

BATTERIES SPARK CONCERNS OVER LANDFILL FIRE RISK

As Christmas approaches, there's growing concern about the heightened risk of landfill fires caused by the incorrect disposal of household batteries. The surge in battery-operated toys and devices during the festive season increases the urgency for responsible disposal.

Every summer, batteries from gadgets and toys end up in regular trash bins, potentially leading to landfill fires. To address this issue, authorities have established free battery recycling collection points at the Port Sorell and Devonport Waste Transfer Stations, as well as the Latrobe Council office. Landfill fires fuelled by batteries pose severe environmental risks. Leaking chemicals from corroded batteries can harm soil, groundwater, and ecosystems. Moreover, the presence of flammable

materials alongside batteries in landfills heightens the fire risk, releasing toxic smoke and worsening air pollution.

Mel Pearce, Project Manager of Dulverton Waste Management stressed the importance of removing batteries from discarded items and using the recycling points. "It's a small effort with a significant impact on community safety and environmental protection," she said. Responsible battery disposal aligns with broader sustainability goals. By utilising these recycling facilities, residents can help reduce landfill fire risks and protect the environment.

This Christmas, remember to responsibly dispose of household batteries at designated collection points to ensure a safer and more eco-friendly holiday season for everyone.

SQUEAKING POINT ROAD CLOSURE

FLOOD MITIGATION UPDATE

SILICOSIS: AN INVISIBLE THREAT

Silicosis, a debilitating lung disease, is often associated with the construction and mining industries due to their significant exposure to crystalline silica dust.

However, what many people are unaware of is that everyday activities can also put them at risk of developing this life-altering condition.

Silica is a common mineral found in various natural substances such as sand, rocks, soil, and even some household items. When these materials are disturbed or manipulated, tiny crystalline silica particles can become airborne. Activities like gardening, DIY home repairs, sanding furniture, or using certain cleaning products can all release silica dust into the air. Even activities like sandblasting, common in art and automotive restoration, pose a risk.

Over time, repeated inhalation of these

airborne silica particles can lead to silicosis. The condition is characterised by scarring of lung tissue, which impairs breathing and can result in chronic coughing, chest pain, and fatigue. In severe cases, it can be fatal. To protect against silicosis, individuals should wear proper respiratory protection, maintain good ventilation, and use wet methods to suppress dust when working with silica-containing materials. Regular health check-ups and early intervention are essential for those who engage in high-risk activities.

Silicosis is a reminder that vigilance is required not only in hazardous workplaces but also in our everyday lives. Awareness and preventive measures are the key to keeping this hidden danger at bay.

One of the Kentish and Latrobe Independent Business Association's (KaLIBA) key roles is lobbying the government on behalf of local businesses. The Association has listened to its members' concerns about streamlining government red tape and regulatory issues.



The business community and key stakeholders recently met and shared their experiences of how red tape and regulatory issues had impacted their business opportunities. There were 23 KaLIBA members in attendance representing various business sectors, each with an individual experience to share.

Reducing red tape is often about dealing with the day-to-day regulations that burden small businesses by being duplicative, heavy-handed, or serve no apparent purpose.

Stuart Clues, Red Tape Reduction Coordinator within the Office of the Coordinator-General, is a strong advocate for regulatory reform for small businesses. He has been working with both industry associations and the small business sector to resolve those micro-reform issues that cumulatively frustrate and stifle businesses.

Stuart facilitated a lively discussion and will use the information gained to inform his submission for the upcoming Red Tape Reform Report which will address necessary changes to further reduce the regulatory burden for small businesses and the wider Tasmanian community, making it easier for businesses to have the certainty to put their money into growth opportunities in our state

PORTSY THE DOG

The Port Sorell Lions Club have purchased a black and white, Tenterfield Terrier puppy for training as a hearing assistance dog. Since 1980, the Australian Lions Hearing Dogs (ALHD) facility has been providing hearing and companion dogs free of charge to Australians in need: around one in six Australians has some form of hearing loss.

It costs around \$40,000 to train, deliver, and support each dog. The patrons who participate in the Friday Shearwater Resort raffles run by the Lions Club of Port Sorell are to be congratulated for the contribution of \$3,000 towards the purchase of Portsy.

So, what's been happening with Portsy? Whelped on 2 February 2023, Portsy has been fostered by an Adelaide carer for puppy obedience training; and is doing quite well. Portsy has visited the ALHD training facilities to become familiar with other dogs; reports indicate that he handled this noisy change in the environment very well.

PORT SORELL AREA DRAINAGE UPDATE

A substantial residential subdivision has been proposed for the vacant land to the west of the current Burgess Industrial Area at Port Sorell. Stormwater runoff from the development is planned to pass through a detention basin to reduce peak flow rates before entering the underground pipe network and then discharging to Poyston Creek.

Council has engaged a stormwater modelling consultant, Hydrodynamica, to model the catchment and overland flow paths. The Stage 1 report for the detailed stormwater catchment assessment of Poyston Creek has been received.

This assessment will provide Council with information to better understand the current and future performance of the Poyston Creek Catchment which forms part of Council's stormwater system in the urban area. Changing rainfall patterns and ongoing development has driven this review.

This catchment is a priority for three main reasons:

- OneCare is looking to further expand its facilities relatively closely to the overland flow path near the southwestern corner of their property fronting Burgess Drive. Certainty on the flood potential both pre and post upstream development is required. The nearby Council land may hold some greater purpose to assist in managing stormwater directly or indirectly;
- The proposed subdivision west of OneCare and Burgess Drive is part of this catchment and a validation of the likely impacts of the development and conceptual stormwater detention system is required; and
- 3. The loss of play time on the Port Sorell Golf Course after

heavy rain in relation to the drain through the site and outfall, noting that sand and high tides reduce the capacity of the outfall considerably. Climate change predictions are that this area will be subject to rising sea levels in the future and has the potential to become less and less playable irrespective of stormwater flows.

At the 11 September 2023 meeting, Council unanimously endorsed the Stage 1 Report. The Report is available in full on the Council website at www.latrobe.tas.gov.au/council/major-projects/port-sorell-area-drainage.

The scope of the Stage 2 Report will include:

- 1. The potential sites for, and provision of, detention basins above Alexander Street and the effect on lower catchment flooding;
- 2. Overland flow path linkages from the upper catchment to the lower catchment;
- 3. Lower catchment (below Alexander Street) volumes and the effect of an eastern diversion to an additional detention facility on Camp Banksia land including a new outfall to Freers Beach;
- 4. Potential reprofiling of the drainage line through the Port Sorell Golf Course to provide additional storage, when the outfall is restricted by a high tide (assumes Tideflex or similar check valve installed); and
- 5. A combination of upper and lower catchment interventions described above.

Subject to community interest there is potential to hold a drop-in session(s) for more detailed discussions after Stage 2 is complete.
