# TOTE BAG INITIATIVE DELIVERS ON SUSTAINABILITY

Isabella Taylor of Latrobe Primary School last year submitted a sustainable planet grant proposal to Keep Australia Beautiful. The concept sought to design and manufacture fabric shopping bags that customers of local supermarkets could utilise if they forgot to bring their own reusable bags.

Successful with her application, Isabella began collecting various design ideas illustrated by very artistic Latrobe Primary School students.

The three illustrations ultimately chosen to be featured on the bags were those designed by Grade two student Macie, Grade six student but now high school student Max and Grade five student Freya.

This program is now available at both supermarkets in Latrobe - Ritchie's IGA X-press and Hill Street Grocer. **How it works** 



If you have forgotten your reusable bags when doing your grocery shopping, you can ask staff to direct you to the reusable bags. You then take a bag, use it, wash it, and return it next time you go to the supermarket, remembering to bring your own reusable bags at that time.

It is important to please return the bags because there are only 60 of them and Isabella wants everybody to have the chance to be able to use them and save Tasmania's environment.

# LOCAL GOVERNMENT REFORM RAISED THROUGH RECOVERY

"Come what may from the State Government election, this Mayor remains convinced that serious reform of the Local Government sector will be a priority during the next term of our State Parliament and that should be no surprise to anyone. My personal view is that the stance by candidates on Local Government reform has an impact on how people vote" said Mayor Freshney. The Tasmanian Government now has the final report from the Premier's Economic and Social Recovery Advisory Council which clearly calls on a need for Local Government reform, highlighting the pivotal role Local Government will need to play in the recovery of our communities and Tasmania as a whole. To fulfil that role, the sector will need to be resilient and sustainable, and the report is clear in stating some Local Government Areas are not.

"The existing Latrobe and Kentish Councils shared services model is nation leading and has been developed and implemented over a significant period. Both Councils have been determined to put in place an ethos of continuous improvement in both the level of service provided to our communities and the way in which services are delivered.

Our staff and management have seen significant levels of change in almost every facet of their day-to-day work activities and much has been achieved with relatively little negative impact on the residents in our two council areas.

Whether or not our resource sharing model survives the next bout of Local Government reforms, that will undoubtedly play out in coming months. The one thing I am certain of is that none of what we have achieved and are achieving would be possible without the commitment and courage (yes courage) of our management team and the dedication and commitment of the teams they lead. Past and current staff members have combined to give real resource sharing a 'red-hot crack' and, if our alliance survives, then the credit and recognition should be theirs. Our elected members appreciate and are grateful of their continued efforts and I trust our community is likewise" he added.

The Latrobe and Kentish Council areas will be establishing a single, independent association to support and represent all local businesses.

The Councils have enthusiastically endorsed the proposal and are providing financial support for an incorporated association with a volunteer Board of Management that will represent a broad cross section of local business people.

The groundwork for the business association will be established with a series of communications and forums to hear the views of local businesses on its charter, objectives, scope, name, and structure.

Part of this work and consultation will include nominations among local business people for an initial "Establishment Board of Management" which will meet monthly.

The model for the Association will be that every business across the Latrobe and Kentish Council areas - from a single home-based venture to our largest employers - will automatically be members at no cost, with representation, regular communications, and a range of benefits.

Businesses that choose to can become paid members to help support the work of the Association with diversity as its hallmark. The objectives of the Association will be to actively represent and support all local businesses and develop programs to boost their success.

The business association will be independent of the Councils but will collaborate with them as the voice of local business to provide ideas, support, and influence economic development activities.


The Association will pursue its own range of benefits, programs and projects, driven by feedback from the business community. In addition, an independent, registered business association automatically qualifies for benefits that include:

## TARLETON ROAD UPGRADE

An upgrade to approximately 1.2km of Tarleton Road from Mersey Main Road to Coal Mines Road continues with works expected to be completed mid-year. This completion timeframe is highly subjective to weather and ground conditions to the point where the resurfacing may be held until ground temperatures increase. This section of Tarleton Road required pavement repairs and strengthening. It was also identified as a strategic link for

> widening to increase the separation between users and the roadside drains. The road surface is being raised on average by 100mm, the pavement widened by around 1.0m and sealed to a width of 6.8m to allow incorporation of white edge lines.

The drains are being relocated closer to boundaries and reduced in depth were practical, roadside vegetation will be removed, existing pavement failures repaired and under capacity culverts replaced.

A concrete footpath is to be constructed next to the boundary on the southern side of the road but remains subject to TasRail approval to cross the rail corridor. The project has been contracted to Walters Contracting.

## HAWLEY ESPLANADE SHARED PATHWAY UPDATE

Round two of community consultation on the shared pathway along Hawley Esplanade has resulted in two defined opinions -

- a shared pathway through the Hawley foreshore with minimal vegetation removal and a lowered road speed limit to 30km/hour or
- a walking track only, keeping all cyclists on the roadway but encroaching further into the foreshore with the construction of boardwalks over bays and the removal of vegetation additional to that proposed.

As with any consultation, it is all about balance. The proposal to be endorsed and presented to Latrobe Council's May meeting will be for "lycra" cyclists (is that politically correct) to remain utilising the roadway, the speed limit to reduce to 30km/hour and social cyclists and walkers utilise the shared pathway through the Hawley foreshore.

This option allows users to enjoy the vistas with minimal vegetation removal to protect the foreshore from erosion.

## SOUTH ESPLANADE PLANS UNSUPPORTED

In the last newsletter, Council invited community comment on a proposal to install defined parking bays, bollards and improve parallel parking capacity on the river side of South Esplanade, including the installation of three speed humps. 17 responses were received throughout the community engagement process with a significant proportion of them not supportive of the proposal. Respondents, especially those that live adjoining the proposed works, advised that speeding vehicles are not an issue and believe that the works would detract from the natural attraction of the area. Council will consider this feedback at its May meeting with the following alternatives to be considered -

- reducing the scope of the project considerably and only bollard off what has been identified as readily accessible hazards to pedestrians and vehicles.
- reallocate the current budget to rectify the existing timber bollards and associated infrastructure in Park

The time has come to say thank you and goodbye to our friends from Vanuatu who are leaving Port Sorell and heading to other parts of Australia to help other growers harvest their valuable produce through the Jobs Australia Seasonal Workers program. What a pleasure it has been to have these people at Camp Banksia and in the Port Sorell community.

From mid-January, 140 men and women have called Camp Banksia and Port Sorell their home and they have been a credit to themselves and to their small island nation.

They have treated the facilities of Camp Banksia with respect, the staff at the camp have enjoyed the banter and the relationships that have developed with all the workers, and the care and loving nature the workers have for each other and those around them is inspiring.

The local community have welcomed the workers like long lost family members and the workers have reacted positively to this. The times when calls were made to the community were greeted with immediate, long term and heart felt responses and to observe that was nothing short of amazing. To ask for warm clothes and to have clothes dropped off at Camp Banksia for the following eight weeks was truly sensation and was matched only by the smiles on the faces of the seasonal workers who were able to walk around in a warm jacket or sleep under a warm blanket (or 2). Islanders getting lifts home from the shops; bikes been donated; people taking workers home for lunch after church; sport, sport and more sport; music, music and more music - the Port Sorell community were amazing and set an example that many have followed.

Will these seasonal workers come back to Port Sorell? That is unknown but they do want to.

For now, though, it is time to acknowledge all that these wonderful people have done for our agricultural sector and the snapshot of diversity they have given to our community and say Tankyu Tumas Baibai.

## PRIORITY ACTIONS APPROVED FOR LANDFILL SITE

Following completion of the Detailed Site Investigation of the former Port Sorell landfill site on the corner of Alexander Street and Hawk Hill Road, Shearwater and lodgement with the Environment Protection Authority (EPA), Council received permission from the EPA to proceed with priority actions. In undertaking the Detailed Site Investigation, a clear understanding of the plausible pathways and implications that the landfill may have on the surrounding area was essential.

The continuation of landfill gas and groundwater monitoring in addition to undertaking the priority actions will ultimately culminate in the remediation of the site to enable its redevelopment as a useable space, meeting community needs into the future.

# **COASTAL PATHWAY INITIATES BELLS PARADE PARKRUN**

It has been a long road for the Coastal Pathway since the concept was first proposed and the Councils adopted the project into their future infrastructure program.

Another big milestone on that journey has now been achieved with the completion of an additional 3.5km section linking Ambleside to Latrobe, with its official opening on 8 April. The track offers users a safe space to travel between the Devonport and Latrobe municipalities with separation from traffic.

Meandering along the Mersey River, the construction of the rock embankment fulfills two roles -

- Supplying a platform on which to build the path in an area which otherwise would be too tight for space and
- Provide significant protection against potential future erosion of the soil embankment supporting River Road.

The rock embankment gives way to an elevated platform which

## **A NEW DIRECTION**

The Port Sorell Advisory Committee (PSAC) is a Special Committee of Latrobe Council, established under the Local Government Act 1993, to consider and make recommendations to the Council on issues relating to the good development of Port Sorell and surrounding areas. The Terms of Reference define these as including traffic management. business/commercial development, recreational facilities, foreshore and environmental matters, land use planning policy and general promotion and development of the Port Sorell area. Historically the committee has been made up of representatives from various community groups specific to the Port Sorell area. The Port Sorell area is defined as Hawley, Shearwater, Port Sorell and Squeaking Point.

Current considerations are to re-vamp and refresh PSAC by streamlining existing representation to community individuals with expertise and skills in the fields of interest contained in the Terms of Reference; reschedule the meetings from monthly to quarterly and hold them out of business hours to attract a greater cross section of community participation. Expressions of interest will be sought in the second half of this year for committee nominations that can enhance the objectives of PSAC in 2022.

# AUSSIE BACKYARD BIRD COUNT

With the Aussie Backyard Bird Count now one of the largest citizen science projects in Australia, the data collected by citizen scientists throughout the Latrobe Council area plays a vital role in providing important information to BirdLife Australia.

Generally, more is known about threatened bird species than our common backyard birds with the Aussie Backyard Bird Count helping to fill this critical knowledge gap. It also helps raise the profile of bird species throughout Australia, highlighting their cultural and ecological importance and promoting a national passion for Australian birds.

Throughout the Latrobe Council area, 57 observers participated in the bird count, recording 4,130 individual birds and 87 bird species.

Topping the list of observed birds was the Silver Gull followed by the Common Starling, Common Blackbird, Masked Lapwing and Crested Term before a significant drop to other birds. Both the endangered Wedge-tailed Eagle (7) and Grey Goshawk (1) were observed as well as seven of the vulnerable, White-

bellied Sea-Eagle.

While data collected from the Aussie Backyard Bird Count is currently only a baseline for monitoring, results from the past five years show that Australian backyards - in all their shapes and sizes continue to attract a range of birds, giving us hope that even as the iconic Aussie backyard shrinks, many native birds can and do remain.

The next bird count will run from 18-24 October.

## HYDROTHERAPY POOL LEASE REVIEWED

Council recently received a draft grant funding deed from the State Government which, once finalised, will allow the \$250,000 to be paid. This money is to be used for improvement works including new pool heating, updated amenities, and other maintenance tasks associated with the former hydrotherapy pool in Latrobe. Uniting AgeWell, the owner of the hydrotherapy pool, is working with Council to finalise the lease agreement between the parties. It is expected that this agreement will be considered by Council in the next 4-6 weeks. Upgrade works will not commence until the lease agreement has been finalised.

A challenge for Council may be the availability of tradespersons to undertake the works once they have been identified and scoped.

As this will be an additional Council operated facility, work is continuing to develop the operating model relating to management arrangements, user agreements, insurance and liability responsibilities, etc.

At this stage it is Council's intention to have the hydrotherapy pool reopen later this calendar year.

# BASS HIGHWAY CORRIDOR REVIEW

In 2018, the State Government made a commitment to upgrade several State roads.

These commitments are detailed in several documents including the State Road Upgrades North West and West Coast - Building Your Future.

In relation to the Bass Highway, a few areas were identified for upgrades including the section between Deloraine and Latrobe.

The Department of State Growth is currently looking at the corridor from Launceston to Devonport. The project aims to assess the existing road corridor and develop a long-term view of potential road infrastructure upgrades and a prioritisation plan for those upgrades to meet the needs of road users into the future.

The immediate priority will be to look at the safety needs of the Deloraine to Latrobe section and identify long term opportunities for the wider section of this road corridor.

To deliver this project, the Department of State Growth has engaged Aurecon Group, who have commenced work to deliver the Corridor Strategy and Implementation Plan.

The first step in this process is to establish a Working Group of key stakeholders who will collaboratively inform the development of the strategy and project priorities by contributing to the identification of issues along the corridor and participating in the Investment Logic Mapping process. Latrobe Council has been invited to have representation on this group. Following this, broader community consultation will be undertaken.

## **CHECK IN APP COMPULSORY**

From 1 May, the use of the Check In TAS App became compulsory in many business premises and event settings.

Up until this time, many businesses have been able to use a variety of contact tracing tools, requiring customers to download multiple Apps onto their smartphone.

Using Check In TAS allows the customer to download the App once, load their contact information then, when entering a business/event, simply scan the QR code with their smartphone camera and the deed is done.

# COVID-19 VACCINE ELIGIBILITY CHECKER

As the COVID-19 vaccine rolls out, there are different phases to receiving the vaccine - Phase 1a, Phase 1b, Phase 2a and Phase 2b.

Do you know what phase are you in? You can find out by completing a short, online survey at https://covid-

vaccine.healthdirect.gov.au/eligibility or, if you prefer not to use the online option, you can call the National Coronavirus and COVID-19 Vaccination Helpline on 1800 020 080.

Currently vaccinations are in Phase 1b which is for people aged 70 and over, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people over the age of 55, adults with certain medical conditions, healthcare workers, and critical high-risk workers. It's important to note that not all general practices have chosen to deliver the vaccine at this stage and supplies are limited to those practices that are providing this service.

If your own general practice is delivering the vaccine and you're eligible under Phase 1b, it's likely that they will get in direct contact with you. Please don't call them to make an appointment if you're not eligible under Phase 1b - general practices have been inundated with vaccination inquiries which can make it difficult for sick patients to get through to them. If you are eligible under Phase 1b and your regular general practice isn't providing the vaccine, you could consider making an appointment at a Tasmanian Government community clinic or Australian Government-funded respiratory clinic. Appointments at these clinics will be allocated on a first come, first served basis. They can be made via the Vaccine Eligibility Checker or vaccination helpline mentioned above.

# LATROBE SETS HIGHEST POPULATION GROWTH ON THE COAST

The Australian Bureau of Statistics recently released its annual Regional Population projects for 2019-20, revealing that the Latrobe Municipality had the second highest estimated population growth (2.8%) of Local Government areas in Tasmania over this period, just slightly behind the Glamorgan-Spring Bay Council (3.2%). This was well over double that of other North West councils and significantly exceeds the state average of 1.2%.

The Kentish Council, whom Latrobe Council has a resource sharing relationship with, recorded the second highest percentage growth (1.2%) of Councils in the North West and is on par with the State average. On the Statistical Area Level 2 population data for the North West Coast, Latrobe and Turners Beach-Forth

equalled each other with 3.1% growth with Port Sorell achieving 2.7% growth. This was closely followed by Penguin-Sulphur Creek at 2.6%.

While the actual number of people differentiates significantly between small and large communities to determine the percentage, the increase maintains the Latrobe Municipality's continued growth which has been sustained over many years. This growth adds to the demand on Local Government to continue to supply services and infrastructure to maintain and enhance the lifestyle that residents are attracted to. Latrobe Council continues to work through its budget process to appropriately fund such activities while balancing maintenance requirements on existing facilities and program provision. The budget is scheduled to be adopted at the June Council meeting.

## GLOBAL REPORT ON AGEING RELEASED

The WHO (World Health Organisation) global report on ageism has been released, highlighting the prevalence of ageism globally and makes key recommendations for how to work together to combat it. The report finds that 1 in 2 people worldwide are ageist against older people and that this impacts on older people's life span, income, poorer physical and mental health, slower recovery from disability and cognitive decline.

"This report also shows just how pervasive ageism is in our society. We see it in our

# SIGNIFICANT ACTIVITIES REVEALED IN STATE OF THE STATE ADDRESS

Premier Gutwein recently provided the State of the State Address with significant recommendations and activities stemming from this announcement. A brief run down on these actions and funding programs include -

## JOBS AND EDUCATION

- 1. Local Jobs Networks Jobs Tasmania \$20.5m allocated to the package that includes:
  - 1.1. New Jobs and Participation Unit in Skills Tasmania to oversee the Jobs Tasmania local networks
  - 1.2. \$2m job ready fund to help job seekers gain essential tools to get a job such as White Card, PPE, Equipment, WWVP checks
  - 1.3. Area Connect Service expansion from six regions to 16 regions (\$3.2m)
  - 1.4. Worker Connect Portal (\$400k) for Tasmanian businesses and job seekers to share and access information including support services, programs and local jobs
  - 1.5. Regional Jobs Show and Events program (\$200k) to showcase local and industry opportunities for employment in partnership with local jobs hubs and community
  - 1.6. Expansion of the Job Matching service (\$2.4m) to match local employers and suitable job seekers
  - 1.7. Tasmanian Employer Bonus (\$6.5m) incentivising employers to take on a long term unemployed person with experience and skills \$6,500 per employer
- 2. \$300m to fund an additional 600 training places in Certificate III in Individual Support
- 3. Extension of Skill Up initiative for a further 12 months (\$1m) provide free training for those most impacted by COVID-19 to upskill or retrain
- 4. Youth Navigators project (\$850k). A youth employment alliance formed between community organisations to deliver triaged services tailored to young people to support them entering the jobs market.
- 5. TasTAFE review and restructure to better meet industry needs and to become an organisation more reflective of business not a school (recommendation to make TasTAFE an independent government business)

#### MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORT:

- 1. \$41.2m over four years to fully fund phases one and two of the Government's Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services
- 2. An extra 80 FTE professional support staff, including school psychologists, social workers, nurses, speech and language pathologists to support children and young people impacted by trauma

## EVENTS AND TOURISM:

- 1. \$1.5m for a Regional Events Recovery Fund to support organisers to undertake activities that contribute to the sustainability of these rich events in regional areas, including additional funding for arts and performance organisations
- 2. \$8m in innovation and development grants to continue to enhance Tasmania's world-class experience reputation, and a further \$500k to extend the business planning support program.
- 3. \$4m in direct financial support to tourism and hospitality businesses identified as critical to regional visitor attraction that remain in acute financial stress
- 4. Tourism Tasmania will invest \$3.5m to deliver our most aggressive winter season campaign ever.

A further program relating to economic development included the Building Construction Support Loan Scheme to provide loan finance to support paused commercial scale building and construction projects. Projects of \$3m+ will be able to apply for

low-interest commercial loans through the Office of the Coordinator General:

## HOUSING SUPPORT INCLUDED:

- \$10m headworks holiday for new residential subdivisions -\$5,000 per residential lot for power, and up to \$5,000 per residential lot delivered for water and sewerage infrastructure
- 2. Finalise an Apartment Code to establish appropriate Permitted and Discretionary assessment pathways for medium-density residential development
- 3. 250 new ancillary dwellings that are made available for longterm rental for more than two years will receive a \$10,000 payment
- 4. Funding will be increased by up to another \$10m, meaning at least another 100 households can realise the dream of home ownership through the HomeShare scheme
- 5. Reset the land tax thresholds to reflect today's strong property market

Finally, a review into **DIGITAL COVERAGE** gaps will be undertaken to identify future investment priorities (and future budget commitments).

# CONTAINER REFUND SCHEME ENDORSED BY LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Local Government has welcomed the State Government's preference for a split responsibility model for Tasmania's Container Refund Scheme.

Mr Dion Lester, CEO of the Local Government Association of Tasmania (LGAT) recently stated that a "Container Refund Scheme is an essential part of a good waste management system and LGAT welcomes the recent State Government announcement of a split responsibility model for Tasmania's Container Refund scheme, as this is something LGAT have been recommending for some time.

A split-responsibility model, like what exists in NSW, will make it easier for community members to return their containers and receive their refund rather than the alternative model that the beverage industry (under the guise of TASRecycle) is arguing for. Under a split responsibility model, the Tasmanian Government will separately tender the scheme coordination and network operator roles. Whereas with the alternative, which is the scheme in place in Queensland and WA, responsibility for running the scheme and operating the collection network is undertaken by a single entity.

This difference is important because in most jurisdictions it is the beverage producers who run the scheme and they are far less motivated to achieve high rates of return. For every container that is not returned these companies retain the 10 cents that the consumer has already paid when purchasing the drink.



It is also not true to assert that the alternative model is better for charities either. For instance, Vinnies in NSW operate six large scale automated depots channelling significant profits back into their operations. Hoxton industries (a disability social enterprise) similarly run several facilities. Since the start of the NSW scheme over \$18m has been returned to charities in donations and recycling fees.

By separating running the scheme from the network the State Government can guarantee consumer convenience and therefore high rates of container return.

Importantly, for councils, the expected reduction in container litter from a container refund scheme not only removes the burden of plastics in the environment, but it also increases recycling rates, maximising the environmental and community benefits of the scheme."

Over the past month, Guide Dogs Tasmania has been raising awareness of the access laws and discrimination that Guide Dogs and their handlers face across the state.

Just as hearing aids, wheelchairs and crutches enable people to live healthy, productive, independent, and dignified lives, Guide Dogs do the very same thing. Guide Dog are working animals that are trained to help people who are blind or have low vision navigate their world safely, and independently. From eight weeks of age, the dogs in the training program are socialised in public areas. They are quiet, well-behaved, nonaggressive and completely clean. When you see a Guide Dog in harness, or wearing an orange training coat, please remember they are legally allowed access to go everywhere their handler does. A Guide Dog has full public access rights in accordance with the Guide Dogs and Hearing Dogs Act, 1967.

Living in a supportive and inclusive community is essential for our quality of life and wellbeing. Let's make sure everybody has the same opportunities to participate in every aspect of life to the best of their abilities.

# **HOW DOES YOUR GARDEN GROW?**

Fallen leaves, cold nights and an urge to tidy the garden signal the arrival of May. Put in unplanted spring-flowering bulbs into the ground or large pots to grow while you are waiting for the bulbs to shoot.

### WHAT TO SOW AND PLANT IN MAY:

**ORNAMENTALS:** Camellias (pots), carnation, cineraria (seedlings), cornflower (seedlings), chrysanthemum (pots), cyclamen (potted plants), daffodil (bulb), deciduous trees (barerooted or pots), delphinium (seedlings), English daisy, echinacea, forget-me-not, freesia (bulb), hollyhock (seedlings), hyacinth (bulb), Iceland poppy (seedlings), jonquil (bulb), lobelia (seedlings), pansy (seedlings), polyanthus, primula, rose (barerooted stock), tulip (bulb), viola (seedlings), wallflower (seedlings)

**PLANT**: Broccoli, early potatoes, broad beans, garlic, spring and salad onions, Japanese turnip and winter lettuce.

**SOW**: Broad beans, English spinach, Asian brassicas and root crops, spring and salad onions, shallots, chives and green manure crops.

In June, bare-rooted fruit trees are available for planting. Many fruit trees need cross-pollination for successful cropping so plant the necessary pollinator or buy a plant that has been multigrafted with a pollinator. If harvests have been low on existing fruit trees in the orchard, fruit set may be improved by planting a pollinating variety.

# PORT SORELL CARAVAN PARK UPDATE

Following the receipt of a \$2.5m loan through the Tasmanian Government Local Government Loan Scheme, the Port Sorell Caravan Park redevelopment commenced in February. To continue to provide a functional caravan park throughout the redevelopment, and especially over Easter and the peak camping periods, the project is being undertaken in stages.



Stage 1 included the construction of new amenities and laundry facilities (pictured). This part of the project is scheduled to be completed in May.

As with any redevelopment, 'what was' will not be 'what is' at the project's conclusion. This specifically relates to the total number of sites.

While there will be a reduction of sites throughout the construction phase, the works will include an associated clean-up of vegetation, specifically blackberries, which provides an opportunity to develop sites in new locations.

Detailed designs for Stage 2 have been completed and are currently proceeding through the necessary approval phase. Stage 2 involves the construction of a new reception/caretaker's accommodation, 10 new cabins (6 standard and 4 premium) and roadworks to clarify traffic movement.

# The existing playground nearest the current reception/caretaker's residence will also be removed and replaced with a new playground to the east of the new amenities and laundry. While the current playground met the Australian Standards at the time of its installation, it is not expected that the equipment will be sufficiently compliant for today's Standards for public use to enable reuse in the new recreation space. This is yet to be assessed. The fenced pre-school playground adjoining the Port Sorell Memorial Hall will remain insitu. Stage 3 will include a new camp kitchen and a new barbecue area.

At the conclusion of the Port Sorell Caravan Park redevelopment, expected in early 2022, a modern facility will be available to meet the expectations of a variety of potential campers while retaining the atmosphere that draws current campers back to Port Sorell time and time again.
