Emergencies can happen anywhere and anytime and can have a significant impact on your life. Unfortunately, having an emergency plan is often overlooked when times are going well.

With the October floods and coming into the bushfire season, it is timely to remind you of the need to be prepared for an emergency. Planning is quite specific to your situation and can mitigate the risks faced in an emergency, reducing the reliance on emergency service organisations who may have competing demands, while also increasing individual and household resilience.



A good emergency plan has three parts:

- 1. What you plan to do **before** the emergency to be ready.
- 2. What you plan to do **during** the emergency to keep safe and minimise the effect of the emergency on you and your property.
- 3. What you plan to do **after** the emergency to get help, recover and return to normal life as soon as possible.

The TasAlert website (https://alert.tas.gov.au) is a useful tool to help you consider issues that may arise in an emergency. On this site, a variety of natural hazards and detailed risk mitigation and preparedness advice is provided.

Depending on where you live, you may have more risk of loss or damage to your home, business or belongings if a natural disaster comes your way.

If the worst happens, you could receive support from family, friends, charities or the government, but this usually won't be enough to cover all the costs you could face. Having the right insurance will help you repair, rebuild, replace and recover.

#### **KNOW YOUR WARNINGS**

Warnings are issued on TasAlert when an emergency may impact you and your community. These provide you with real time information on what is happening and what you should do. Remember, if you think you are at risk, do not wait for an official warning to act.

Using a set of nationally consistent icons, the Australian Warning System (AWS) warning levels are Advice (Yellow), Watch and Act (Orange) and Emergency Warning (Red).

Advice (Yellow) means that an incident has

started. There is no immediate danger but stay up to date in case the situation changes. Now is the time to check in with neighbours. This alert might also be used to advise that a threat has reduced.

**Watch and Act (Orange)** is an indicator of a heightened level of threat. Conditions are changing and you need to <u>start taking action</u> now to protect you, your family, your clients and your business.

**Emergency Warning (Red)** is the highest level of warning. You may be in danger and need to take immediate action. Any delay now puts lives at risk.

#### I HAVE SPECIAL NEEDS

Some in our community are at an increased risk in an emergency because they experience reduced health and wellbeing, reduced safety and security; limited mobility; low understanding of risk/warnings; low literacy or English language comprehension and social, physical or geographic isolation.

If you are not already registered with your carer organisation or community nursing, you can register your details with Council which will be shared with emergency personnel to coordinate relevant support if required.

#### YOUR EMERGENCY KIT

An emergency kit is your "go" bag and

#### THE CAT LOVER'S DILEMMA

You see a small cat out in the street, and it looks a bit thin and scruffy. As an animal lover your first instinct is to help, so you put a saucer out with some kibble. Before you know it, you're feeding 15-20 cats and a cat colony begins.

Life in a cat colony is tough, and the frequency of illness can be high with the average lifespan being 5 years, whereas pet cats can live 15-20+ years!
Free-roaming cats are also at a higher risk of physical harm and pose a risk to human health through the transmission of toxoplasmosis - a parasitic disease carried by cats that costs Australia \$6B a year.
Toxoplasmosis occurs in higher rates in Tasmania than elsewhere in the country and has health implications for production animals and wildlife.

So, what can you do if you want to help? Firstly, chat to your neighbours; you might be feeding a neighbour's greedy pet cat. It's also worth contacting RSPCA Tasmania to establish whether the cat has an owner. If not, you might consider taking ownership of it yourself. Desexing and microchipping will safeguard your cat against getting lost or contributing to stray populations through breeding. Keeping your cat up to date with vaccinations and worming treatments will ensure it has a better quality of life. ### BE A RESPONSIBLE PET OWNER

Pets and owners alike enjoy going on walks, runs, and enjoying the outdoors. However, what is the proper etiquette while doing this with your furry friends? Here are two ways you and your pet can minimise your impact on the natural world, while also being considerate of others and compliant with the Dog Control Act 2000.

#### KNOW BEFORE YOU GO

Make sure pets are allowed in the area you are going to. Rules or laws that don't allow dogs in certain areas or during certain times are in place for a reason. It could be to protect a delicate ecosystem, or to give wildlife a little extra room or prevent incidents in high populous areas. Either way, knowing before you go can make a big difference on you and your pet's experience.

Council has a list of areas on their website and in the Dog Management Policy. People who enter a prohibited or restricted are with their furry friend risk a fine up to \$724.

### PICK UP YOUR PET'S WASTE AND DISPOSE OF IT PROPERLY

Picking up your dog poo is the first step in contributing to a harmonious and sanitary neighbourhood for all to share and enjoy. **It is also law.** 

Picking up after your dog means you are doing the right thing by the environment. Some dog droppings contain harmful bacteria and nutrients which, if left outdoors and it rains, can be washed down drains and end up in local creeks. Always carry dog waste disposal bags and either dispose of what you pick up in a Council provided bin or take it home to dispose of it in your own waste bin. People who don't pick up after their dogs risk a \$181 fine.

#### LOCAL BUILDING UPDATE

193 building, plumbing, and commercial applications and notifications of works were received by Council from May to October inclusive.

They comprised of 46 dwellings; 12 dwelling additions/alterations; 28 outbuildings; 12 commercial/industrial; 2 demolitions, 86 plumbing applications, and 7 other applications with a conservative value of \$34,847,082.

#### **BUILDING WITHOUT A PERMIT**

As a property owner there some building activities that you can do about your home. You can do general maintenance and repairs on your home; build fences, low decks, farm sheds and carports but some larger projects will need to be carried out by a licensed builder without needing a building permit.

You can build small structures no bigger than 18m<sup>2</sup> or erect a prefabricated shed up to 36m<sup>2</sup> (this means factory-made components or units that are transported and assembled on-site to form the complete building).

You may be able to contract a licensed builder to build a new house and a licensed building surveyor to approve the building. You do need to notify your council when you have finished building certain low risk work by completing Form 80 Notice of Low-Risk Work.

**BEFORE** commencing though, you do need to check with Council if a planning permit is required.

#### WHAT IS NOTIFIABLE WORK?

Building work is classified as notifiable building work when it is medium risk and will not be assessed by a council or it is not being carried out in a hazardous area or by an owner builder. Notifiable building work includes:

- Class 1a kit homes (single story only)
- in appropriate soillarger sheds, garages, carports
- decks, boundary walls, fences, tanks, swimming pools
- Class 1a building which is standardised and fits within the Planning Directive 4.1.

Alternatively, you may need the services of a Building Surveyor and Builder. In Tasmania, both practitioners must be licensed. You can check this status online at www.cbos.tas.gov.au

#### STARTING TO BUILD AND MOVING IN

You can start building when you receive a planning and building permit (if your council said you needed these), or your builder gets a start-work authorisation from your Building Surveyor.

You can move into your new house, extension or addition when all permit conditions are met, and you receive a Certificate of Occupancy for council. Source: www.cbos.tas.gov.au

#### TINY HOME BUILD RULES

Studio pods, tiny homes or 'granny flats'

can provide a great solution to easily add to the habitable space on your property, or even to provide a cost-effective independent dwelling. However, building laws do apply to these structures. The Building Act 2016 requires that all building work in Tasmania, including the construction of an ancillary dwelling, must comply with the Building Act 2016 and the National Construction Code (NCC). Failure to comply with the Act or the NCC may result in the building work or pod installation being deemed illegal building work. Local Councils may subject the work to a compliance and rectification order or an order for demolition at your

Tiny homes, studio container pods and 'granny flats' are all considered 'habitable buildings' regardless of whether they are used for sleeping or permanent living. All new habitable buildings are, at a minimum, Notifiable Building Work. This means that they need to be designed by a licensed designer, approved by a licensed building surveyor, built by a licensed builder and a licensed plumber if plumbing work is required.

These requirements exist to ensure that the building or container pod is safe, compliant and fit for occupation.

#### WHAT ABOUT STRUCTURES ON WHEELS?

If a structure is built with wheels (e.g., a caravan or a trailer) and is capable of being registered as a vehicle by the Tasmanian Motor Vehicle Registry at the Department of State Growth, it is not considered a building, so the requirements for building approval do not apply. However, there may still be planning matters to consider, so you will need to contact council prior to proceeding. What about containers or pods used as sheds, storage sheds or workshops? Containers or pods used solely for storage or as a workshop (such as a woodworking shed) may be classed non-habitable and categorised as Low Risk Building Work, and therefore would not be subject to the

same controls listed above. However, this is dependent on the use, materials, height and other conditions, so you should consult a building surveyor or council to be certain.

#### **REDUCING HOUSING STRESS**

The Tasmanian Government's grant of \$10,000 towards the construction of an ancillary dwelling (aka granny flat) to help boost housing supply, support home ownership and put downward pressure on rents closes on 31 December or until the program is fully subscribed (whichever comes first).



The dwelling must be on residential property which only has a single dwelling. The build must also only have a floor area of less than  $60\text{m}^2$ , be self-contained and separate to the primary dwelling. It must also share access and parking, water, sewerage, gas, electricity and telecommunications and meters with the primary dwelling and be available for long-term rent for at least two years. ### HAWLEY ESPLANADE PATHWAY PROGRESS

Further to extensive consultation with the community on the development of a shared pathway along the Hawley Esplanade to reduce the co-mingling of pedestrians, cyclists, mobility impaired etc. with the motoring public, the development application has now been submitted to Parks and Wildlife Service for their consent to lodge.

Upon their approval, the development application will then be lodged with Council's planning department and will proceed through the normal statutory planning process.

#### PORT SORELL TOWN ENTRY

Minor footpath and kerb amendments have been made to the design and survey work at the Port Sorell roundabout on the corner of Alexander/Wilmot Streets following community feedback on visibility and the need to further slowdown traffic movements through the intersection. With 'in principle' approval for the works received by the Department of State Growth, it is expected construction will commence in the near future.

# BANKSIA FACILITIES REDEVELOPMENT ON TRACK

Two construction teams are working on the Banksia Facility redevelopment with the scheduled completion date of the accommodation section being April 2023. One team is focusing on the new accommodation units and, when completed, will commence work on the new camp kitchen area.

The other team is continuing with the reconfiguration and extension of the performing arts and office space within the Banksia Centre.

The final elements of the public area/play space contract are being progressed, enabling these works to commence and tie in with the landscaping of the camp area. The appointment of Ms Taylah Lucadou-Wells as the Banksia Facilities Supervisor has enabled capacity to commence taking future camp bookings and facility enquiries. #### CAR PARK ON THE LIST

Marine and Safety Tasmania (MAST) continually assess potential new infrastructure and upgrades to existing infrastructure to enhance recreational boating and safety. As part of this process, they have identified 19 projects statewide including lifting the car park level at the Port Sorell boat ramp.

While work remains to be undertaken on consultation, costings and approvals, this project is tentatively scheduled for implementation during the 2023-24 financial year.

### **FLOOD MITIGATION UPDATE**

Progress on the 266m culvert from Cotton Street through to Gilbert Street is nearing completion.

Following the road sealing of the Cotton and Victor Street Levee in early January, this road will reopen to traffic.

The Kings Park Inlet construction works are continuing through January and February which requires footpaths in the nearby vicinity to be temporarily closed for public safety. Please comply with all barriers and notifications.

The River Road Levee works are continuing.

Works will begin near the Edward 'Teddy' Sheean VC Memorial early in the new year with a portion of this walking track also temporarily closed for public safety.

Work on the Gilbert Street culvert crossing is scheduled to begin towards the end of February/early March. The intention remains to keep a single lane of traffic open during these works which will enable the completion of the culvert to the centre of the road and then transfer traffic to the other side for its completion. This will result in traffic delays. Motorists are encouraged to use the Cotton and Victor Street route during these works.

# FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR FLOOD IMPACTED BUSINESSSES

Tasmanian small businesses that have been impacted by the severe weather event on 13 and 14 October 2022 can apply for a Small Business Emergency Response Grant.

Grants of up to \$25,000 are available for small businesses that can provide evidence of direct damage from the severe weather event on their business.

Jointly funded by the Australian and Tasmanian Governments under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements, these grants can be used to help with the costs of the clean-up and reinstatement of a small business. Grants are not available for the loss of revenue, wages or income. Further information, including eligibility criteria and application details is available on the Business Tasmania website. #### **PRIMARY PRODUCERS**

A separate grant of up to \$25,000 is available to support flood impacted primary producers with clean-up and restoration activities.

#### INDEPENDENT LIVING

Rubicon Grove, Port Sorell provides residential aged care for 80 clients with four of those beds for short term respite care. This is provided under the parent body of OneCare.

As part of OneCare's ongoing pursuit of emerging opportunities to meet the needs of the aged, they are exploring the potential for independent living units. For due diligence, OneCare are engaging with Council on the walkability linkage to such a development, should it proceed. At the time of writing, OneCare's General Manager has advised that this potential development is awaiting the completion of further stormwater modelling of the area. Council's General Manager advises that "\$100,000 has been allocated for stormwater catchment studies which is the next step to take and also the priority." This study is due for completion in the very near future.

Also, the Tasmanian Government does not make unsolicited calls offering grants or money. If you receive a call or email, and your submission number is not included, or you have not applied for a grant at all, please do not supply information and immediately contact Business Tasmania on 1800 440 026.

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#### SOCIAL HOUSING BUILD

Housing Choices Tasmania have received approval to construct 33 new home units on two parcels of land in Percival Street and Benny Streets, Latrobe.


These homes are architecturally designed and will be built to a high standard, providing much needed accommodation for those who are struggling in the current housing market.

"With close to 4,500 applicants on the social housing waitlist we are looking forward to being able to support the provision of long terms, secure and affordable housing for those who need it," said the General Manager of Housing Choices Tasmania Ltd, Kim Bomford. The development of the site will be staged. Stage 1 works, consisting of 10 units, are scheduled to commence in the near future with occupancy scheduled before the end of 2023.

#### SUBDIVISION APPROVED

At its November meeting, Council approved a 17-lot subdivision to create 19 lots and a road at 120 Stanley Street South and 78 Benny Street, Latrobe.

This will be a staged development, commencing with Lots 1, 13, 14 which separately titles properties with existing road frontage from the balance land (pictured below).



# REDEVELOPMENT OF PORT SORELL CARAVAN PARK

Stage 2 of the redevelopment of the Port Sorell Caravan Park continues.

This work includes the construction of a new caretaker's residence/reception building, internal roadway upgrades and underground infrastructure for powered sites.

The new powered sites are now ready to book while the new residence and reception are due for completion early in the new year.

Stage 3 is currently in its final stages of planning and will include a new main entrance to the park off Darling Street, bringing patrons directly past the new reception building for streamlined check in/out.

### NEW MANAGERS FOR PORT SORELL CARAVAN PARK

#### RIDE OR DRIVE - STAY ALIVE

Cycling has enjoyed a growth in popularity in recent years but with cars and bikes increasingly competing for the same road space, those on both sides of the lane can turn a bit surly and do things we typically wouldn't do.

In Tasmania, when drivers overtake a cyclist, they must give:

- 1m of space when the speed limit is signposted at 60km/h and under
- 1.5m of space when the speed limit is signposted at over 60km/h.

It is also essential only to overtake when it is safe to do so.

There are however exemptions to overtaking a cyclist safely. Motorists can:

- Cross the centre line markings if safe to do so (i.e., no vehicles coming towards you)
- Cross a flat dividing stripe
- Cross a painted island

If you can't overtake safely, you should wait until you can.

Tasmanian law also allows cyclists to cycle two abreast. They often do this to be seen more clearly.

When cycling two abreast, riders must be within 1.5 metres of each other and can take the whole lane, if necessary, to be visible.

When overtaking cyclists two abreast, drivers must continue to follow the minimum passing distance law.

When overtaking a cyclist, it is important to remain patient and considerate.

A few seconds waiting for a safe place to pass can easily be made up later and can save a cyclist's life.

Remember to be aware of the roadway and watch out for cyclists. We all deserve to Arrive Alive.

Situated in George Street, Latrobe is the Latrobe Swim Centre, known by the locals as the "Latrobe Pool".

The Latrobe Pool turns 40 this year with photos sought of the site before, during and after construction.

This 25m, four lane heated pool is great for family fun, kids swim and play, birthday parties and functions. There is also a toddler play area with warm water pool and friendly welcoming staff. #### REPRESENTING COMMUNITY

As part of its community engagement process, Latrobe Council provide opportunities for individuals in the community to nominate for positions on several committees.

Currently, there are vacancies on the Port Sorell Advisory Committee (PSAC) and the Camp Banksia Facilities Committee for outgoing, community minded individuals.

PSAC are seeking a business, tourism and two youth representatives.

In this role, you will meet quarterly (currently 7:00pm on the fourth Tuesday of the month) and, after consulting with the sector that you represent, provide recommendations to Latrobe Council on the future development of the greater Port Sorell area with an emphasis on safe and liveable communities, environmental integrity, tourism and investor appeal. The representative role on the Banksia Facilities Committee is to recommend to Council initiatives for the continual improvement and management of Camp Banksia and the Banksia Centre. 

### UPGRADE OF ORGANICS PROCESSING FACILITY

Dulverton Waste Management is progressing with the construction of its new indoor organics plant.

The new plant was approved by EPA in late October with the assessment noting that there would be significant improvement in the environmental performance when making compost. The new facility will reduce the risk of odour nuisance to houses near the site as all air will go through scrubbers and biofilters prior to release. Making the compost in enclosed tunnels also has the benefit of reducing the time to make the product; an issue that has been a challenge through the recent wet seasons.

Veronica Schilling, CEO of Dulverton said "COVA Haywoods will be building the plant with support from local contractors. The expected first loads of material going through the process will occur in mid-2024."

Designed to handle household organics as green bins roll out across the region, as well as factory food waste, the new facility will be instrumental in achieving reduction in landfill over the coming years.

Composting is cheaper than landfill, with the added benefit of reduced greenhouse emissions and improving soil health on local farms.

The project has been possible with state and federal funding support as part of the shift to a circular economy.

#### **LEGAL AID AVAILABILITY**

Providing legal advice, representation, family dispute resolution services and legal education, their purpose is to provide legal services to help Tasmanians understand their rights, navigate the system and get the assistance they need. They support and advocate for vulnerable and marginalised Tasmanians and work with clients, staff, legal partners, and community to improve the legal system. Their criminal law team go to court to represent people, whether for a bail application, or mental health diversion and drug diversion. They also have designated lawyers for young people.

Their civil law team meet with a range of people including those who might be experiencing elder abuse, NDIS clients, people before TasCAT Mental Health or involved in a Royal Commission, and others with minor civil claims.

Their family law team provides specialist

services to people affected by family violence, especially children, and mediation services for separating couples. Their legal services are delivered through in-house lawyers and private lawyers.

### LATROBE HYDROTHERAPY POOL

Hydrotherapy is the use of warm water, maintained at a temperature of 34°C, to treat many health conditions, from rehabilitation to soothing aches and pains or just to get you moving more freely again.

The Latrobe Hydrotherapy Pool, co-located at 37 Moriarty Road. Latrobe on the Uniting Agewell site, was closed by the Tasmanian Government in 2020 on the basis that it was not financially viable.

Council consulted with local service providers on how the facility could provide opportunities for broader community use and lobbied for its reopening, without success. Council then proposed to the State Government that it would take over the operation of the Latrobe Hydrotherapy Pool subject to the State Government funding a facility upgrade. The State Government provided \$400,000 for upgrade works.

These works included disability compliant change and shower facilities, fitting one changeroom with a ceiling hoist and automatic bed and installing a new heating system to reduce operational costs. The facility is also fitted with a defibrillator, first aid kit and

necessary safety equipment.



Moving forward to May 2021 and the Latrobe Hydrotherapy Pool reopened for public use under Council ownership and managed by Deepwater Swim School, who have more than 25 years' experience operating pools.

Since then, the Latrobe Hydrotherapy Pool has been meeting the therapeutic needs of residents and visitors. As well as physiotherapy organisations utilising the pool for client sessions, individuals and small groups are also booking in to strengthen their muscles, decrease the impact on joints, decrease pain, improve balance and coordination, improve flexibility and movement as well as improve circulation and sleep.
