LAND FOR SALE

8 Fairway Crescent, Shearwater was transferred to Council from VHT Developments for 'public open space' as part of a subdivision in 2010.

Zoned General Residential under the Latrobe Interim Planning Scheme, the land area of 1439m² has remained largely undeveloped since being transferred to Council ownership.

In 2019 Council purchased three vacant parcels of land at 8 Club Drive, 4 Fairway Crescent and 2 Fairway Crescent.

At the time of purchase, these blocks were identified as strategic properties to allow for the future development of public spaces at Shearwater, primarily due to their proximity to Shearwater Village and the skatepark. The skatepark and amenities are on a separate adjoining title, with that area being known as Addison Reserve.

With the addition of the blocks purchased by Council in 2019, and the skatepark area, all now available for public recreational purposes, it is considered that 8 Fairway Crescent is 'surplus to requirements and therefore should be sold. This decision was adopted by an absolute majority of Council at its meeting on 7 March.

To maintain a buffer between the skatepark and future development at 8 Fairway Crescent, Council will excise a strip of land 3.9m x 35.5m (139m²) from the existing title and add it to the skatepark title. Additionally, the notation of "public open space" will be removed from the title, enabling it to be developed for general residential purposes, as currently zoned under the Latrobe Interim Planning Scheme.

With the ongoing demand for improved public facilities throughout the Port Sorell area, any funds realised from the disposal of 8 Fairway Crescent could be reinvested into further developing such facilities.

HAWLEY STORMWATER INUNDATION

As a result of a significant rainfall event resulting in between 86mm and 100mm of rain falling in the Port Sorell area on 28 February-1 March, several residences were impacted by the stormwater runoff. This event is likely to have been in the order of a 1% Annual Exceedance Probability (AEP), which means that the likelihood of this or a larger event occurring in any one year is 1% (or less) based on published statistical design information. The underground piped systems are not designed for this rate of runoff.

installation of kerb and channel in Sankey Street to better contain the flows. This is in addition to other works currently planned for the Sankey Street detention basin. As for Taroona Street, kerb and channel have been proposed along with potential upgrades to the stormwater infrastructure to accommodate the extra water intercepted and collected from the street. While kerb and channel have historically been opposed in the Hawley area, other practical, mitigating improvements are likely to be limited and ineffectual. The provision of additional protection over

In many instances, the rainfall overloaded the design capacity of the stormwater systems, resulting in the inundation of properties as water flowed with the natural fall of the land or 'overland flow path'. Sankey Street was the most impacted, with water entering several properties. Other affected areas included Taroona Street and Dumbleton Street.

Council is currently investigating what action can be taken to mitigate against such future events.

Preliminary considerations include lowering the intersection of Sankey Street and Hawley Esplanade to create an overland flow path to the foreshore area by using the roadway. This could require the

and above normal design rainfall events is a balance between the cost of infrastructure, the cost of what is being protected and the risk of the event occurring and the damage that may result. It is important to note that rainfall in Australia has displayed both large natural variability and large trends during the past two decades. Variability is mainly due to large-scale atmospheric and oceanic drivers that affect the region. Council asks residents who have been impacted by the recent rainfall event to get in touch to help Council understand how they were impacted, where limitations exist in our network, and to consider potential future improvement works.

PLANNING FOR CHOCOLATE WINTERFEST, LATROBE

With the easing of COVID restrictions expected to continue throughout the year, consultation is underway to determine whether *Chocolate Winterfest*, *Latrobe* can proceed in August. The coordinator is currently pursuing the option of extending the dates, enabling unique, bookable activities to be held in the

preceding days, which can then increase the capacity of activity coordinators.

One event that is happening regardless is the Chocolate Wonders of Wearable Art competition.

BE THE BEST DOG OWNER

Dog ownership brings many joys, but it also requires responsibility. To ensure the welfare of your furry friend, consider the following tips:

- Provide your dog with regular exercise to reduce the risk of it wandering off.
- Keep your dog on a leash in public places to ensure the safety of other people, animals and your dog.
- Make arrangements for your pet's care if you're going away.
- Consider having your pet desexed.
- Regularly worm your pet and treat it for fleas and ticks.
- Ensure your pet is always kept securely on your property.
- Vaccinate your pet.
- Make sure your pet is easily identifiable with a collar and tag with your contact details.

As part of being a responsible dog owner, under the Dog Control Act 2000, it is a legal requirement that you register your dog when they reach six months of age with your local government body and microchip them.

It is also important to keep your details up to date with Council to improve the chances of your pet being returned to you if they become lost.

Council needs to know if:

- You have moved to a new address in the Council area with your dog.
- You have moved to a different Council area with your dog.
- You no longer have your dog. You can update your details by filling in the Change of Details Form located on the Council website (www.latrobe.tas.gov.au) or in person at the Council Offices. In updating the above, don't forget to also update the microchip registry as well.

TASSICAT RESOURCES

TassieCat encourages all Tasmanians to become responsible cat owners.

Amendments to the Cat Management Act 2009 came into effect on 1 March.

These changes mean that you are not able to keep more than four cats above four months old on a single property without a multiple cat permit.

Cats above four months old will also be required to be microchipped and desexed. The State Government will no longer accept applications for cat breeder registrations. Anyone wishing to breed a

cat in Tasmania will be required to be a member of a cat organisation or will have the option of applying for a conditional permit to breed a cat.

Cats, prior to sale, will also need to be desexed and microchipped, wormed and vaccinated.

WOOD HEATER TIPS

It's that time of the year when the weather starts to cool and wood heater use increases

It is also when the inadequacies of using your wood heater can result in increased wood use and a smoke nuisance.

Smoke is generated when there is incomplete combustion of the gases released from the wood.

Incomplete combustion occurs if the burning temperature is not high enough - the volatiles will not ignite and pass up the

chimney/flue as smoke or if there is not

enough oxygen mixing with the fuel.

To improve combustion in your wood heater:

- Ensure the flue/chimney is clear and cleaned regularly.
- Use plenty of kindling (sticks and twigs) when lighting the fire. Also, place scrunched up paper throughout the kindling to help with increasing the draft.
- Ensure the vent is open, leave the door slightly open and, keep a check on the fire, add some wood after about five minutes, then close the door.
- Keep the vent open for at least 20 minutes after adding new wood or starting the fire. Do not use the fan during this time.
- Ensure wood is reasonably dry, not green.
- Stack the wood at a right angle to the door to allow air to circulate between the logs
- Don't overstack the heater. There should be a gap above the wood to allow better combustion of the gases.
- Check your flue/chimney remember excess smoke is fuel wasted.

MAKE YOUR MARK

While the reform of Local Government may lead to a different format of Local Government, that process will not be sufficiently progressed by the time this year's Local Government elections are scheduled to be held on 25 October. If you are a critical thinker, can work as part of a team, understand finances, are capable of contributing to the development of policy and want to make a positive difference to your community, then why not consider nominating for your local Council? If you don't already have a community profile, now is the time to start working on that.

To nominate as a Councillor, you must be an elector in the municipal area. There are also other criteria that apply.

It is important to note that Councillors are NOT involved in the day-to-day administration of the Council. That is the responsibility of the General Manager.

WHAT IS THE ROLE OF A COUNCILLOR?

The role of the Councillor is defined in S28 of the Local Government Act as -

- (1) The councillors of a municipal area have the following functions:
- (a) to represent and promote the interests of the community;
- (b) to facilitate communication between the council and the community;
- (c) to review the performance of the council.
- (2) In carrying out their functions, councillors are to -
- (a) act in the best interests of the community; and
- (b) ensure that resources and access to services and facilities are provided equitably.

UTAS BURSARY AWARDED

Each year, Latrobe Council offers a \$3,000 scholarship via the University of Tasmania (UTAS), to assist a resident from the Latrobe Municipality (postcode 7307) to access tertiary study.

This is managed via UTAS and promoted through their scholarship portal at apply.scholarships.utas.edu.au.

The application period is from August to October each year (closing 31 October), for allocation commencing in Semester 1 of the following year.

Along with this funding grant, there is also an opportunity for the recipient to participate in work experience opportunities with Latrobe Council, where relevant.

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RECREATION GROUND CHANGEROOM REDEVELOPMENT

In November 2020, Latrobe Council endorsed an updated development plan for the Latrobe Recreation Precinct, which refers to areas bordered by Cotton, Stanley, Last and Bradshaw Streets and included Perkins Park and the swimming pool, Bosworth Park and the Latrobe Recreation Ground

The Latrobe Recreation Ground Changeroom redevelopment was one of five priority projects identified in the planning undertaken by Council.

The project aims to create additional change room and toilet facilities under the main grandstand to cater to the increasing numbers of female players in both cricket and football and provide modern and safe

facilities for both the home and away teams, umpires and officials.

Council staff and members of the Latrobe Football and Cricket Clubs worked together on finalising design plans. The estimated cost of the project is \$1.5 million.



Latrobe Council has successfully applied for funding under the Tasmanian Government's 2021-22 Improving the Playing Field Grant Program and has been awarded \$500,000 for the changeroom redevelopment.

The Labor Party has since announced an election commitment funding of \$500,000 towards the project if elected in the upcoming Federal election.

Latrobe Council has allocated funds in the 2022-23 budget to ensure the completion of this project.

Construction is anticipated to commence later this year with the completion of the project prior to the start of the 2023 football season.

Future works at the Latrobe Recreation Ground include upgrading the Latrobe Band room facilities. The extent of this project is being scoped by Council in consultation with the Latrobe Federal Band, however, it does not form part of the funding commitment received.

TINY HOUSE REGULATIONS

"Tiny house" is a trendy name for small dwellings that appeal to those downsizing their home or wanting a simpler lifestyle. Some tiny houses are intended to be permanently attached to the land. Others are attached to wheels so they can be moved to different locations.

BUILDING APPROVALS

Building laws apply to the construction and use of dwellings of any size, either a complete building or a new structure such as a granny flat, sleep-out etc. All new building and plumbing work in Tasmania must meet the standards of the National Construction Code - ncc.abcb.gov.au.

MINIMUM SAFETY STANDARDS

All Australian Governments jointly maintain a system for regulating the supply of road vehicles to the market known as the Australian Design Rules (ADS), intended to make vehicles safe for use on the road. Before a road trailer or caravan can be registered for the first time, it must meet the Motor Vehicle Standards Act 1989 and the ADS requirements. The Vehicle Standards Bulletin No. 1 also provides details of construction requirements for trailers and caravans. If a structure does not comply with these requirements, then it is not registrable as a vehicle. You can find more information on the ADS and Vehicle Standards Bulletin No. 1 at www.infrastructure.gov.au

MODIFICATIONS

If a trailer is registered but later changed, it will require a Modification Certification in line with Tasmanian registration regulations at www.transport.tas.gov.au

PRE-MANUFACTURED HOMES VS CARAVANS

The fact that a dwelling can be manufactured off-site and relocated on wheels to another place does not make it a

"caravan". To fit that meaning, it must also be capable of being registrable as a vehicle and meeting Vehicle Standards Bulletin No. 1.

The vehicle's placement or attachment on land will require building approval or a temporary occupancy permit for the modified structure. Contact your local Council for information on the building approval process.

PERMITS FOR RELOCATABLE TEMPORARY STRUCTURES

Temporary structures or prefabricated buildings erected for a temporary purpose require a temporary occupancy permit for their placement and occupation instead of building approval for permanent use. An application for a temporary occupancy permit can be made with a building surveyor.

IS IT ILLEGAL TO REVERSE OUT OF DRIVEWAYS?

A growing concern in the community is the number of close calls between cars reversing from driveways and near misses with pedestrians on the footpaths.

Under the Tasmanian Road Rules, motorists are required to drive with due care and attention and not reverse a vehicle when unsafe to do so.

It is a timely reminder to motorists to be extra vigilant and slow down when reversing, especially from driveways where visibility is reduced by parked cars, trees, signs, and other obstacles. Little people move so fast, and older people move so slowly, please be aware of them all and drive accordingly.

- Australian servicemen of the AIF who took part in competitive international woodchopping events between Australia, New Zealand and Canada on the battlefields of France in the First World War.
- Those who served in 2/1, 2/2 and 2/3 Australian Forestry Companies of the Royal Australian Engineers, Australian Imperial Force during the Second World War.
- Employees from the forestry industry and various Australian State and Territory Forestry Departments who served with these or other branches of the armed service.
- Australian servicemen who took part in competitive woodchopping events in England, Scotland, Papua New Guinea, New Britain, Morotai, the Northern Territory and Queensland or as returned servicemen (some as amputees) during and after the Second World War.

This is a fascinating and neglected part of Australia's history.

AN ACCIDENTAL DRUM MAKER

Tarleton residents Russell and Lisa Tomlin recently appeared on ABC Northern Tasmania, showcasing the story behind Russell's hobby of making steel tongue drums.



Russell never thought that he would be making musical instruments but due to an injury, he needed something to fill his day. While not musical, Russell has always appreciated music and considered making a hand pan drum. With the cost proving prohibitive, he discovered how to make steel tongue drums from old gas bottles. "The first one I made saw Lisa standing there with a fire extinguisher as I cut into the gas bottle. Fortunately, it wasn't needed as I took the necessary precautions," said Mr Tomlin. When created, they played it for guests staying at Belle's B&B. They loved it and

"The original prototype was not to the standard that they have since become but it had an emotional effect on them, which is what happens. Nowadays, I make steel tongue drums ranging in size from 6-15 inches and they are tuned to a note, frequency or scale on either a musical or calming frequency.

asked to buy it.

Generally purchased by musicians, schools and nursing homes, the calming frequency is suited for meditation, yoga, reiki as they are said to be attuned to the natural vibration of the earth," he added.

While the drums remain a hobby for Mr Tomlin, interest has really taken off since

the ABC story. "I can't make them fast enough, however, to me, their creation is more about making something that someone appreciates. That feeling is overwhelming. It makes me proud. It generally takes 2-3 days to make a drum, and I currently have a waiting list of two weeks. If I could make them quickly while keeping the same satisfaction from the process and not diminishing the product, I probably would," said Mr Tomlin. Mr Tomlin's steel tongue drums can be purchased online via Facebook Marketplace.

RESOURCES FOR FARMERS

Updates have recently been provided for Land Tasmania's very useful "Enterprise Crop Suitability Maps" (ESMs) and related climate layers. Completely new datasets for several pasture crops have been added to the available layers on LISTmap, as well as updates to previously available ESMs and modelled climate projections.

To find the new layers, go to LISTmap, and "Add Layer". Look under "Farming" for the ESM layers for 32 different Tasmanian crops.

These layers combine soil, topographic and climate data to identify the places that are currently "well suited", "suitable", "suitable (with intervention such as soil management or frost protection)", and "unsuitable" for that crop. If you then look under the "Farming Climate Change" section, each ESM crop has two available layers that show the land suitability under future climates in 2030 and 2050. The climate parameters are based on Climate Futures for Tasmania projections under the Representative Concentration Pathways scenario 8.5.

As part of the Australian Government's Future Drought Fund, a Tasmanian pilot of the Farming Forecaster tool is being run in northern and southern Tasmania.

Real-time weather and soil data will be available through an app to assist graziers

available through an app to assist graziers in understanding pasture availability and varying climate conditions.

Currently, the Farming Forecaster works for some regions in NSW, but Tasmanian data will be available soon.

Construction of the new bridge at Warrawee has re-started again. Once completed, the bridge will be the longest pedestrian-only suspension bridge in Australia!

Bridge construction came to a halt in July 2021 due to its proximity to an active wedgetail eagle's nest. With the mating season at an end, the crews are back on site and working hard to ensure it's completed before those amorous eagles get started again!

When complete, this attraction will entice visitors to explore the Warrawee Reserve by foot or experience the wilderness of Wild Mersey MTB.

LOCAL FOSTER CARERS SOUGHT

With nearly 50,000 children unable to live safely at home in Australia, there is a critical need for more foster carers across the country.

While each child has a unique set of needs and experiences, almost all come from complex family and social situations where they may have suffered neglect, trauma or abuse.



"Fostering a child is primarily about offering a safe, supportive and respectful home environment," says local Life Without Barriers Carer Engagement Officer Kylie Gibbs. "This can be long-term full-time, emergency or respite, which is one weekend per month."

Life Without Barriers welcomes carers from all backgrounds and cultures. To become a foster carer, the ability to care for and nurture a child is what really matters. There are some pre-requisites for becoming a foster carer in Tasmania, including:

- You must be over 21 and in good health
- Have a stable home (rent or own) with a spare bedroom
- Be an Australian citizen or permanent resident
- Willing to undertake background checks, including a National Police Check, Child Safety Check and be eligible to obtain a Working with Vulnerable People Registration.

Life Without Barriers' foster carers are never alone in their caring journey. To ensure carers feel supported and confident in their role, they are provided with ongoing training, 24/7 on-call support and a tax-free allowance to support the needs of children in their

NEW PICNIC TABLES AT PORT SORELL PRIMARY SCHOOL

As the students and staff arrived at Port Sorell Primary School on the first day of the 2022 school year, they were delighted to see a collection of eight (8) new wooden picnic tables in their undercover area.

The tables were designed, created and installed by the Port Sorell Men's Shed. During 2021, the school decided that they wanted to provide outdoor tables for the children attending the school's Breakfast Program. The Port Sorell Men's Shed was approached to see if they could assist with this project.

The Men's Shed had already been extremely generous earlier in the year in donating a wheelchair to the school for use by students with mobility issues.

The team from the Port Sorell Men's Shed were then very proactive in sourcing a community grant from Cement Australia to finance the tables. SUP-PLY, joinery suppliers in Devonport, supplied the laminated tops at cost price.

This has been a significant story of community collaboration and connection, and the children, staff and parents at Port Sorell Primary School are extremely grateful to the Port Sorell Men's Shed for making this possible.

The picnic tables not only enhance the school grounds, providing seating for the Breakfast Program, but can also be used for other school activities and community events hosted at the school.

The timing has been ideal as the tables have helped to provide COVID-safe outdoor learning spaces for students and staff.

OVERCOMING LONELINESS

A Latrobe High School program is bringing students together with older local community members.

Emma Forbes, Support and Tier 3 Teacher at Latrobe High School, has been organising the program and said it's been great to see the positive impact on students and the participating community members. "We have already seen wonderful intergenerational relationships being built. Students are demonstrating respect and kindness to the senior citizens, and they, in return, are developing an understanding of the younger generation and how different it is to be a teenager in the modern world." The program is supported by grant funding from the Mental Health Council of Tasmania (MHCT), in partnership with Primary Health Tasmania.

THE NATIONAL SCHOOL CHAPLAINCY PROGRAM EXPLAINED

Gabbie Rogers-Smith is asked many questions as part of her role as school chaplain at Port Sorell Primary School. One of the most common is, "Gabbie, what's a school chaplain?"

Part of a school's wider student support team, school chaplains in Australian government schools work toward the overall wellbeing of students and the wider school community (including staff and families).

In short, the aim of school chaplains is to identify and respond to the emotional (primarily) and physical and social needs of the school community, providing pastoral care and support. But what does this look like on the ground? Here's a usual day in the life of Chappy Gabbie at Port Sorell Primary School.

- Breakfast Club before school (courtesy of Loaves and Fishes and some champion volunteers);
- visiting various classrooms throughout the day - getting alongside individuals and small groups, assisting with their work while getting to know them over time:
- meeting with one of two individual students to do art/drama/gardening while providing pastoral care and/or building resilience and emotional maturity;
- chatting to staff in the staff room and/or being present in the playground at recess and lunch; and
- talking with parents before and after school.

LIVE PERFORMANCE SUPPORT PROGRAM

The Live Performance Support Program gives arts organisations, festival organisers, and performing arts venues the confidence to plan performances in Tasmanian theatres and other venues.

CAMP BANKSIA UPDATE

Significant progress has been occurring at Camp Banksia with AJR Construct Pty Ltd engaged to undertake the redevelopment works on the vacation of the site by the seasonal workers. The redevelopment will see Camp Banksia offline for around 12 months and barricaded accordingly.

Stage 1 includes work on the accommodation area. These two dormitory-style accommodation huts will house 38 beds each and are suitable for schools, community groups and large family gettogethers. Additionally, it enables Camp Banksia to provide camps to more than one group simultaneously.


Stage 2, which will be undertaken concurrently with Stage 1 with a delayed start, sees works commence at the Banksia Centre. This will result in the Performing Arts room being unavailable for this stage as works are undertaken to extend its size.

This will enhance the rooms' ability to be utilised as a multipurpose space with exhibitions of local history and arts in the foyer. The management of the Camp Banksia facility will be relocated to the Banksia Centre.

Existing toilet facilities near the stadium will remain accessible with plenty of notice provided should their availability be compromised intermittently.

Stage 3 involves relocating the camp kitchen, constructing an undercover BBQ area nearer the future play space area for greater public use, constructing new public toilets, upgrading the laundry, installing all underground services for future works, creating footpaths, associated landscaping as well as constructing a new maintenance shed more appropriate for the management of the facilities. This will commence once the accommodation area (Stage 1) is complete.

Council will keep the public informed of potential disruptions as they occur, in addition to providing regular updates on the redevelopment itself via Council's Facebook page (latrobecounciltas) and the website - www.latrobe.tas.gov.au
