Waste management in the Cradle Coast



Do you know what waste management services are operating in our region?

It's the kind of thing that most people don't think about... and it's a sign of good waste management operations if it's not obvious.

Usually people only wonder about what happens to our waste if there is a problem – you'd certainly notice if rubbish was piling up on the street because it wasn't being collected or if more tip sites were needed because there were no recycling services, causing these materials to take up valuable space in landfills.

Planning, managing and maintaining waste management services and facilities is an important job; and it's also a big job involving many people, across many places and relying on specialist equipment.

This fact sheet, and the others in the Rethink Waste series, has been created to provide you with the big picture of waste management in the Cradle Coast region. It shows how our contributions to rates and the gate fees we pay at waste and recycling centres help us all to benefit from good waste management services.

Who's involved in waste management in the Cradle Coast?

We all play a part in ensuring that our homes, workplaces, schools and public places are free from waste and are healthy environments for current and future generations.

Across the Cradle Coast there are many people employed in the delivery and maintenance of waste management services from garbage truck operators and environmental officers, to engineers and sorters on the recycling lines.

Seven Councils in the region participate in the Cradle Coast Waste Management Group: Burnie City, Central Coast, Circular Head, Devonport City, Kentish, Latrobe and Waratah-Wynyard. This group works together to deliver efficiencies in waste management and waste education. A good example is the regional kerbside recycling contract.

What waste management services exist where?

There are 3 landfills and 12 transfer stations in the region that dispose of approximately 91,000 tonnes of waste per year. Transfer stations exist in Burnie, Castra, Preston, South Riana, Ulverstone, White Hills, Spreyton, Sheffield, Wilmot, Port Sorell, Wynyard and Waratah.

A materials recovery facility for recycling is located in Spreyton. Recycling from across the Cradle Coast is transported to this facility for sorting and dispatch on to processing plants interstate and overseas.
