HAWLEY FORESHORE SHARED PATH UPDATE

At the Latrobe Council Meeting on 10 May, council discussed and endorsed the revised plans for the Hawley Foreshore Pathway project.

These plans reflect consideration of the feedback and comments received and set out to achieve a balance between the path alignment, user safety, project cost, state, and national design guidelines and of course, minimisation the impact on foreshore vegetation and aesthetics.

The plans can be viewed on the Latrobe Council website (www.latrobe.tas.gov.au), at the Shearwater 7 Day Makeover shop front in Quinlan Crescent, Shearwater, or at the Council office, 170 Gilbert St, Latrobe, until 4:30pm Monday, 12 July. Key points of the revised plans are:

- Path Geometry and Safety
 The alignment has been moved closer to the edge of the existing foliage where possible to minimise the potential interaction between path users and motorists. This has enabled the radius of several curves to be reduced which, in turn, will lower bicycle speeds.
- Path Width and Finish
 Council has adopted a 2.5m wide path which is consistent with
 the previously completed sections from Shearwater Park to the
 Don Brown Memorial. This width not only meets the
 requirements of existing users, but future growth and
 expansion of the path potentially into East Devonport and
 beyond.

In terms of the pathway Council has elected to use an exposed aggregate finish which will, we expect, reduce the impact on aesthetics and at the same time provide appropriate access for multiple users including wheelchairs, prams, and walking aids etc.

There are also sections of elevated walkway/boardwalk to minimise the footprint on the landscape. These sections have, however, been kept to a minimum due to their higher construction and ongoing maintenance costs.

The next step in this project is to work through and obtain the necessary approvals, clearances and permits required before finalising the design and construction documentation. Despite our best efforts, Council is acutely aware of the difficulties in gaining permits for projects proposed for construction in environmentally sensitive coastal shoreline areas.

Construction timeframes will be dependent upon the approvals process and the availability of contractors to undertake the construction phase which is expected to commence before the end of 2021. Further updates will be made available as the project progresses.

The Latrobe Council appreciates and thanks all those who have attended briefings and made submissions to aid in the development of this project which will, we believe, provide increased opportunities for physical activity in a safe environment while enjoying the unique qualities of the Hawley Foreshore Precinct.

LEADING THE NATION IN LOCAL GOVERNMENT REFORM

Resource sharing and shared services models have delivered a productive and sustainable local government model for the Latrobe and Kentish municipalities that can be a model for other communities

Councils are under pressure to evolve and reform to meet the challenges of financial sustainability, changing community needs and expectations along with future IT requirements.

The Latrobe and Kentish shared services model has the potential to address the issues of long-term sustainability for local government and should form part of any discussion about local government reform.

What this means, in a practical sense, is the two councils have amalgamated staff, while retaining their local elected representatives for each municipality. Rural and regional communities highly value that level of representation.

More than 17,000 people live in the Latrobe and Kentish municipalities, and each day both Councils' endeavour to meet community expectations with the effective delivery of a wide range of shared services. The Kentish and Latrobe Councils lead the nation in resource sharing.

When the Councils began the resource sharing journey 12 years ago, it was understood that the process would be one of

collaboration between Council and the community, focusing on delivering what the community needs.

The Premier's Economic and Social Recovery Advisory Council's (PESRAC) final report proposed that Parliament should drive reform in Tasmania's local government sector. The report went on to recommend the development of an expert panel that would deliver achievable reforms in the local government sector. This recurring conversation on local government reform has highlighted the issue of local government amalgamation and the various benefits that are assumed to flow from it. However, history has shown that amalgamation does not deliver an improved service model nor long-term sustainable change. It also leads to an erosion of democratic representation for decentralised populations.

"Kentish and Latrobe Councils are looking forward to a continued collaborative working relationship with the Tasmanian Government, that brings positive outcomes for our communities," said Latrobe Mayor Freshney.

"Now is the time to have an open conversation around the future of local government reform and how the two tiers of government can best work together," stated Kentish Mayor Wilson.

KEEP BUS STOPS CLEAR

Since January, local bus company Merseylink has operated seven (7) days a week, enabling residents to transit between Latrobe, Port Sorell, Sheffield, Devonport and beyond, as well as providing transport options for students attending local schools.

As a result of this, bus zones are in effect seven (7) days a week meaning vehicles must not park in bus bays at any time of the day.

Failure to keep the bus bays clear for buses can result in a fine.



Merseylink also recently acquired four new school bus contracts which will commence from 1 July 2021.

The four contracts will travel throughout the Mersey region and complement existing Merseylink services, including the public bus service that operates four trips daily between Sheffield and Devonport, via Railton and Latrobe.

The acquisition of the new contracts allows students travelling to schools in Latrobe, to connect with the relevant Merseylink service, providing more options for students and parents. ELDERLY INDEPENDENT LIVING

Did you know that Latrobe Council own and manage 57 community and 7 social housing units throughout the town of Latrobe for the actively independent aged? Units are co-located across multiple blocks of land and within easy walking distance of numerous facilities and services. The one- or two-bedroom units are designed to meet the needs of the aged that are still able to live independently. They are not disability units though. Successful tenants are offered lifetime tenancy of a unit through an open-ended lease.

There is a waiting list with individuals prioritised one-bedroom units and couples prioritised two-bedroom units.

Allocation is on a "first in, first come" basis, provided the applicant/s meet the eligibility criteria.

LOCAL BUILDING UPDATE

A total of 180 building, plumbing, and commercial applications and notifications of works were received by Council for the 4-month period from February to May inclusive. They comprised of 72 dwellings; 6 dwelling additions/alterations; 17 outbuildings; 5 commercial/industrial; 79 plumbing applications and 1 other application with a conservative value of \$32,231,017.

LEARNING ABOUT LOCAL GOVERNMENT



INFRASTRUCTURE UPDATE SANKEY STREET, HAWLEY

A stormwater improvement project to alleviate capacity issues in the lower portion of Sankey Street is currently in design. There are several service utilities that need to be crossed and the design team are working through these. Following completion of the design, the works will be programmed with a contractor to complete the works. Impacted residents will be notified prior to works starting onsite.

HAMILTON STREET, LATROBE

Survey works for kerb and channel on the eastern side of Hamilton Street, between Thomas and Reibey Streets, has been completed.

The design process is scheduled to start shortly with construction expected to be completed in the 2021-22 financial year. The project will address issues with the existing retaining wall which is in a poor condition as well as the alignment and width of the road. At this stage, the existing heritage listed culvert under the road (which was built in 1916) will be retained. Other design issues to be addressed include the existing TasNetwork pole on the corner of Thomas Street which may require relocation. Council will work through this process with

TasNetworks. Driveway accesses have also been identified as a potential issue to ensure changes in the gradient do not cause vehicles to "bottom out" or scrape when entering and leaving properties.

DUMBLETON STREET, HAWLEY

Works should be nearly complete on the construction of kerb and channel on the southern side of Dumbleton Street, Hawley from Hawley Place to the carpark and address a drainage issue.

MORIARTY ROAD, LATROBE

A footpath extension is to be built on the western side of Moriarty Road, Latrobe between Forth Street and the Torquay

Earlier this year, students at St Patrick's School visited Latrobe Council to learn what Local Government does in a community. After the excitement of sitting in the Mayor and Councillor's chairs subsided, they heard from:

- Mayor Freshney on how Council is structured and who it represents;
- Alex Hayes, Council's Development and Regulatory Control Office spoke about responsible dog ownership with the students getting to try out a microchip detector;
- Community Development Officer Michelle Dutton spoke about Council's role in events, various organisations, and activities in our community as well as the importance of volunteering;
- Jonathan Magor, Infrastructure and Assets Manager spoke about waste management, ran a hands on exercise on recycling and showcased some of Council's capital works, including drone footage of a road being constructed; and
- Gleny Nicholls, Environmental Health Officer, spoke about good food practices as well as reinforce hygiene, providing students with a hands-on example of how quickly germs can spread.

Should other schools in the Latrobe Municipality like to take advantage of a similar opportunity to learn about Local Government, Council would welcome your enquiry to the Community Development Officer.

Road/Hawkins Street intersection funded by the State Government's Vulnerable Road User program.

A couple of constrictions exist that need to be addressed in the design process, specifically power poles and a TasNetwork power turret. This section of road also has a high crossfall on driveway accesses which need to be reviewed as part of this, or a future project.

Crossfall of the footpath will be directed to the road to ensure run-off from the works is directed to the kerb and channel.

DOG REGISTRATIONS DUE

The *Dog Control Act 2000* requires that all dogs aged from 6 months must be microchipped and registered. Registration not only allows Council to keep better control of the dog population but also to provide improved facilities and conditions for responsible dog owners. Some benefits include:

- Positive identification of your dog
- Reuniting lost or injured dogs with their owners
- Investigation and resolution of dog problems
- Funding of educational programs to encourage responsible dog ownership
- Operation and maintenance of animal pounds
- Dog patrol services to reduce the number of stray dogs on streets and in public places
- Encouragement of de-sexing of dogs through discounted registration fees
- Reduced registration fees for early registration

If your dog/s is/are already registered in the Latrobe Municipality you will receive your registration renewal notice the first week in July.

The introduction of lifetime tags in July 2019 made it possible to renew registrations online. Payment options will be outlined on your renewal notice.

If you have moved into the Latrobe Municipality with your dog or get a dog throughout the year and it is 6 months or older, it must be registered with Latrobe Council.

New registrations will be accepted at the Council office from 1 July with the discount period ending on 31 July. From 1 August, the full fee applies.

SPEED LIMITS CHANGE

Changes to the speed limit along Parkers Ford Road will soon be implemented, dropping the current 80k/h to 60km/h from the roundabout on Port Sorell Main Road through to Gardams Road. This has resulted from the density of development which increases vehicular movements. From Gardams Road south to Woodbury Lane, the road will remain at 80km/h. While making these changes, the speed limits along Mill Dam Road and Charles Street at Squeaking Point were also reviewed, resulting in those roads being reduced in speed to 60km/h, also because of the development density. Along Charles Street, the speed is to be

further reduced to 50km/h near Pademelon Drive and then 40km/h just West of Potoroo Lane on the approach to the boat ramp and Squeaking Point Esplanade intersection.

While the Commissioner for Transport within the Department of State Growth is the legislative authority to set speed limits in Tasmania, Council has a form available that ratepayers can complete for a review of a speed limit in a particular area. Council then assesses the application which may include community consultation of residents affected by the proposed change along with vehicle and speed counts.

If deemed justified, Council will endorse the application and forward to the Department of State Growth for further consideration and approval.

CRASH STATISTICS

When considering the performance of all intersections and road links, crash statistics are a valued resource.

While near misses are encouraged to be reported to Tasmania Police as they are an indicator to potential emerging issues, the crash statistics detail accidents where Tasmania Police have been called or a police report has been filed.

Over the past five years, the top three worst intersections for accidents in the Latrobe Municipality have been -

- Bass Highway and Moriarty Road 18
- Mersey Main Road and Railton Road -12
- Bass Highway and Gilbert Street 11



These intersections are on Department of State Growth main arterial roads, and, with high traffic volumes, it is no surprise that these intersections feature strongly in the crash statistics.

WATCH FOR FARM MACHINERY

The Community Road Safety Committee are consulting with the Tasmanian Farmers and Graziers Association on whether there is an existing form of signage that rural property owners may source to alert motorists that their heavy farm machinery is operational, particularly in high periods of activity i.e., harvesting etc.

The placement of this signage should assist in increasing awareness of farm vehicle activity, enabling motorists to drive with increased care and attention.

TARLETON ROAD DELAY

The Tarleton Road reconstruction, drainage improvements and footpath contract between Mersey Main Road and Coal Mines Road has been delayed due to an inability to source product.

The contractor is currently working to lock in a commencement date that will allow the sealing to occur without the need to maintain a gravel surface for an extended time.

With this methodology, there won't be a longer construction period; motorists will not be impacted by the frustration of potholes developing because of the exposed road surface; and the scope and cost for the project should remain substantially unaffected.

In addition to these works, Council is looking to budget the reconstruction of

Tarleton Road from Jowetts Lane to Cornick's Road/Seymour Street in the 2021-22 financial year.

ONLY RAINWATER SHOULD GO DOWN DRAINS

Washing paint brushes and other DIY equipment into drains, with pollutants such as oil and dirt, can end up in our waterways, killing fish and other stream life. Paint is toxic, and dirt and sediment can have long term impacts on water clarity, making it harder for fish to breathe, see and eat.

Once sediment enters a waterway it can settle on the bottom and smother the natural bed where algae and invertebrates live and fish like to hide. Some fish also have such high levels of these toxins that they can be harmful to humans if eaten. So, when you are doing work in the garden, or cleaning a muddy vehicle or painting equipment, remember only rainwater should go down the stormwater drain. Significant penalties can apply. POWERING COMMUNITIES

Community groups are invited to apply for funding through the upcoming *Powering Communities Program*. This program will support projects such as:

- Installing solar panels or a battery
- Upgrading equipment such as air conditioners, hot water systems or refrigerators to more energy efficient models
- Replacing lighting with more energy efficient LEDs or
- Conducting an energy audit



Grants between \$5,000 and \$12,000 will be available to eligible community organisations, with no co-contribution required. Expressions of interest (EOI) close on Monday, 2 August.

RUBICON RICE GRASS UPDATE

A recent Rubicon Rice Grass Information session saw participation by 34 residents. Cradle Coast Authority, in partnership with Latrobe Council, secured funding to reduce the 660Ha Rice Grass infestation in the Port Sorell Estuary.

Rice Grass was treated north of a "containment line" between Squeaking Point and Eagle Point to establish a Rice Grass Free Zone and protect Coastal Saltmarsh. A trial treatment of a Rice Grass meadow commenced at Finger Point, Rubicon Estuary, to monitor sediment movement after control. Currently, the most cost effective and least environmentally damaging herbicide for Rice Grass control is Fusilade Forte. This herbicide does not affect native saltmarsh species or seagrasses, is rapidly absorbed, quickly degrades and has very low toxicity to estuarine fauna.

Even though wet and windy weather has hampered the Rice Grass program from November to April, the total area treated this season was 436Ha. Weed contractors completed follow-up work at Narawntapu National Park and reported a kill rate of 90%. Weed treatment has commenced at North East Arm, Brown's Creek, Squeaking Point, Thompsons Creek and Panatana Rivulet. This project will conclude in June 2023.

MAJOR REDEVELOPMENT AT MERSEY COMMUNITY HOSPITAL

Work will soon begin on a major redevelopment at the Mersey Community Hospital to expand the hospital's outpatient, operating theatre, endoscopy, and day surgery facilities. Works include:

- an additional endoscopy unit;
- redeveloped day procedure unit;
- expansion of recovery unit;
- expansion of operating theatres

Mersey Community Hospital Nursing Director of Operations Anthony Hurst said early works had already begun on the project.

"Patients and visitors will have already seen the worker's site compound adjacent to Torquay Road, and signage is in place to direct people away from this area," Mr Hurst said.

"Following the completion of these early infrastructure works, the actual building project will begin in late 2021 and take around two years to complete.

All hospital services will continue throughout the project, however there will be some noise, changes to parking and some service disruption throughout. We thank the community in advance for their patience as we work to upgrade and expand their hospital," said Mr Hurst.

FLOOD MITIGATION UPDATE

"Council welcomes the announcement by the Tasmanian Government that it will fund a total of \$4.67m towards Latrobe Flood Mitigation measures.

The indicative budget estimated for the project in the aftermath of the floods was \$4.467m however, following the geotechnical survey, extensive hydraulic modelling and engineering, and the associated detailed design work, the cost is now just over \$14m," said Mayor Freshney.

Much has happened in the five years since the floods with the "build back better" theme prominent in design.

Extensive modelling and investigation of possible flood mitigation options have been undertaken.

"While there have been obvious risks associated with the delay in constructing the flood mitigation project, Council's priority has always been to ensure that extensive due diligence would ensure that the project provided the protection that our community deserves.

Council now has a Letter of Intent with local company, BridgePro, to construct the flood mitigation project however the design requires further work. Once those boxes are ticked, further stakeholder consultation will be undertaken," said Mayor Peter Freshney.

SHERWOOD DRIVE, LATROBE

A blackspot, due to limited sight distance, has been raised at the junction of Railton Road and Sherwood Drive.

While Council requested remediation as part of the Department of State Growth's current works on Railton Road, their program did not allow for such a variation. With a recent HipCamp site opening at Sherwood Drive, the emergence of long vehicles is perceived to potentially exacerbate the sight issue. Council is continuing to pursue this matter with the Department of State Growth.

CAPITAL PROJECT DELAYS

While the stimulus of the construction market has worked well, one could argue that it may have worked too well in Tasmania.

Council is not exempt from the fluctuation of this building boom, particularly in delivering its capital works program. Market factors continue to increase not only material costs but impact on the availability of contractors to the extent that significant delays are being experienced. Combined with spiralling costs, the impact on a fixed budget and meeting funding deadlines are a challenge.

This situation is directly impacting on the redevelopment works at the Port Sorell Caravan Park and Camp Banksia. Stage 2 of the Port Sorell Caravan Park redevelopment, which includes a new reception/caretaker's accommodation, 10 new cabins and civil works to reconfigure the entry to Darling Street, were scheduled to commence in May but have now been delayed. The committee are reviewing the priority of all components of Stage 2 and whether there is capacity to defer one of more of its planned deliverables to Stage 3 while maintaining camp operations. In relation to Camp Banksia, various considerations and adjustments have been made to the design with work now scheduled to commence in November 2021. This has enabled several groups to benefit with the availability of the camp for bookings until then.



HYDROTHERAPY CHALLENGES

Council recently agreed to accept a grant of \$250,000 from the State Government and enter into a 3 + 3 year Licence Agreement with Uniting AgeWell, the owners of the hydrotherapy pool. The grant will fund the construction works required for the upgrade and maintenance of the Strathdevon Hydrotherapy Pool. Once complete, the facility to again become available for community use.

The way in which the hydrotherapy pool functions will have a large bearing on the financial impact on ratepayers.

Canvassing of several service providers indicates there is support for use as a hydrotherapy pool (34-35 degrees) as opposed to a warm water pool (32 degrees) for a possible 20 hours a week. Initial projections indicate that the hydrotherapy pool will run at a deficit of between \$50,000 - \$100,000 annually, which is a cost that will ultimately be borne by our ratepayers.

The financial investment needs to be balanced with Council's desire to enhance the health of our community, especially those requiring hydrotherapy pool services to assist in the rehabilitation of medical conditions or alleviate chronic conditions. The challenge will be setting a user fee that is affordable but also contributes to the operational costs, so the facility becomes cost neutral.

The hydrotherapy pool should be operational by the end of 2021, subject to contractor availability.

NUISANCE CATS

Have you ever found a cat that you didn't own wandering on your property? You're not alone, around half of Tasmanians say that roaming cats are a nuisance in their neighbourhoods.

If you have one in your neighbourhood, read on, because we're going to help you deal with the issue responsibly.

Firstly, it's important to understand that it's not the cat's fault that it has become a nuisance. These issues normally come about when a cat hasn't been suitably contained at home by its owners or properly trained. So, as much as you might feel frustration towards the cat, try to remind yourself that it has no idea that it's a nuisance to you.

Initial steps are -

- Speak with the owner;
- Do not feed the cat;
- Try "cat-proofing" your yard You can also deter cats from roaming around your yard by:
- Covering sandpits to reduce the risk of unpleasant surprises in the sandcastles.
- Wet your garden before bed. Cats hate getting wet paws.
- Install a motion-activating water sprinkler, or an ultrasonic deterrent device.
- Create a cat deterrent garden. Plants such as Lemon Thyme, Pennyroyal, Coleus canina and Lavender are effective.

While trapping a wandering cat is legal, the cat must be safely returned to its owner or to the RSPCA. Animal cruelty is an offence and harsh penalties do apply. For more information, go to https://www.tassiecat.com/

RIVER ROAD, LATROBE

With the construction of the coastal pathway alongside River Road, Latrobe, concern has been raised at the potential interaction between motorists and users of the pathway and a speed limit reduction suggested.

This was considered during the design process with Council funding the installation of additional guard rail in our section. Council personnel have recently investigated the concerns and advise a reduction in the speed limit along the Latrobe section could not be supported.

SASSAFRAS ROAD ISSUES EAST SASSAFRAS INTERSECTION

Council staff are investigating the geometry of the East Sassafras Road and Greens Creek Road intersection following reports that the intersection may not be sufficiently wide enough for vehicle manoeuvrability.

There is conjecture those motorists are not travelling through this intersection with due care and attention in accordance with the Road Rules.

It is prudent though, that the situation be investigated as, if the road is not sufficient to needs, some road widening may need to be undertaken.

HIGHWAY SPEED LIMIT

The 80km/hr speed limit on the Bass Highway between Devonport and Latrobe, travelling East, currently comes into effect at the end of the passing lanes just past TasFreight.

The Department of State Growth are currently investigating moving the 80km/hr limit further towards Devonport due to safety concerns with trucks merging onto the highway.

CHAPEL ROAD ACCELERATION LANE

Turning onto the Bass Highway from Chapel Road, into 110km/hr traffic, can be hazardous.

While there are deceleration slip lanes for motorists turning from the Bass Highway into Chapel Lane, there is a disparity exiting Chapel Lane.

As a main thoroughfare from the Port Sorell area to the Bass Highway, the installation of an acceleration lane is one potential project that will be considered as part of the Department of State Growth's Corridor Strategy and Implementation Plan of the Bass Highway through the Latrobe Municipality.

GAS VENT FROM TRENCHES

Rehabilitation investigations are continuing for the Port Sorell Landfill site situated on Alexander Street between Hawk Hill Road and Club Drive.

An assessment of the likely pathways for landfill gas to leave the site has been conducted and a vent trench is to be constructed along the western end of the Club Drive boundary.

The vent trench is likely to be about 100m long, 2m deep and 1m wide and filled with granular gravel, allowing any gas emissions to come up and out of the ground rather than potentially leaving the site.

This vent trench is likely to remain in place and form part of the site's overall remediation.

BEAUTIFYING THE LATROBE MUNICIPALITY ONE TREE AT A TIME

Council's Tree Planting Committee met regularly to discuss future planting programs to naturally beautify the Municipality.

MORIARTY ROAD, LATROBE

With planting complete on the Eastern side of Moriarty Road, the planting of trees alongside Mersey Community Hospital side of Moriarty Road has been raised with management.

CLUB DRIVE, SHEARWATER

Following the footpath upgrades in Club Drive, the tree committee has tentatively identified locations for vegetation plantings to beautify the approach to Shearwater Village.



approach to Shearwater Village.

These installations are subject to fine tuning following consultation with residents along Club Drive.

ST GEORGE'S PARK, LATROBE

Tree planting has commenced along the Moriarty Roadside of St George's Park and into Forth Street.

The committee are proposing to Council that a shelter, tables and chairs be installed at St George's Park to encourage utilisation.

GILBERT STREET, LATROBE

With the new roundabout works at the junction of Gilbert and Hamilton Streets, Latrobe, further trees have been installed along Gilbert Street.

This program will be continuing throughout the 2021-22 financial year.

STATION SQUARE CARPARK

A series of Silver Birch and various shrubs are being planted behind the Station Square carpark and along the boundary of the self-contained camping area to provide screening from the paddock and beautify this area.

COMMUNITY SUPPORTED THROUGH ANNUAL GRANTS PROGRAM

Each year, Latrobe Council allocates \$20,000 in its Community Grants Program. There are two parts to the Community Grants Program.

ARTS, CULTURE AND FESTIVALS SPONSORSHIP funds new or established events and major festivals that comply with COVID restrictions and build our cultural identity, support accessibility, and deliver a diverse range of community arts and cultural activities within the Latrobe Municipality, assisting them towards self-sustainability and enhancing the Municipality's events calendar.

Successful Round 1 applicants include -

- Latrobe Football Club will receive \$2,000 to assist with digitising the photographic and memorabilia history, creating an interactive history room in this their 140th year.
- The Latrobe Garden Club are supported with establishing and advertising a new Latrobe Garden Trail event in December 2021 with \$1,500.
- Choir in the Club have been funded \$2,000 to purchase of sound desk and accessories to stage Choir in the Club at multiple locations and with capacity to support self-sustainability by hiring the equipment to other events.

• Crescendo Music Hub will receive \$2,000 towards the staging of a Latrobe Youth Music Festival and specifically to secure professional guest presenters that will enhance and develop local talent.

The **EMERGING NEEDS** Grants are designed to encourage community partnerships that address an unmet need within the Latrobe Municipality in the fields of Minor Capital Works; Health and Community Welfare; Environment; and Sport and Recreation.

Successful applicants include -

- Port Sorell Table Tennis Club with a contribution of \$2,000 towards the purchase of competition grade table tennis tables.
- Latrobe Basketball Association will receive \$1,817 to replace two laptop computers to better support scoring and statistical information: and the
- Latrobe Bowls Club will receive \$2,000 to offset the purchase of a replacement refrigerator for their bar.

FREE ROSE PRUNINGS

Free rose cuttings will be available to the community on Thursday, 22 July from 10:00 am until 12 noon at the Latrobe Post Office Reserve, Gilbert Street, Latrobe. This is an annual initiative by Council. Rather than simply mulching the cuttings, they are offered to people wishing to either start growing roses or expand their existing floral display.

"The display of roses around the perimeter of the Latrobe Post Office Reserve in Gilbert Street, Latrobe was initially planted with a donation of rose plants by the CWA in the 1950's.

While natural attrition has resulted in the replacement of some of these roses over the years, the current crop is an extremely hardy lot, coping very well with the climatic conditions of Latrobe," said Latrobe Council's Green Spaces Leading Hand, Mr Shaun Tuthill.

The roses have varying flowering times throughout Spring and Summer with colours ranging from white, yellow, apricot, a blend of yellow and orange, light pink, pink, dark pink through to burgundy and purple.

Some plants are highly fragrant whereas others just have a hint of perfume. Blooms range from singles to doubles and

vary in height, up to 1.5 metres.



LATROBE TO GET PUMPING

Latrobe about to jump on the pump track trend with the establishment of one at Bosworth Park.

Bounded by Gilbert, Stanley and Cotton Streets in Latrobe, Bosworth Park is undergoing a staged transformation to encourage useability.

The site has so far been developed with the construction of a playground, barbecues, public toilets, and the Latrobe Dog Park. Landscaping has commenced along Cotton Street and dog obedience classes also utilise this reserve.

Next on the list is the construction of a pump track which is a series of curves, dips and transitions that are designed to be ridden by riders of all skill levels and ages by "pumping" - generating momentum by up and down body movements - instead of



Consultation on design is underway with construction, subject to the availability of contractors, expected to commence in October.

WILD MERSEY BRIDGE WORKS

BridgePro are continuing to work on the construction of the bridge over the Mersey River at Warrawee with visitors to the area requested to comply with site signage for their own safety.

This construction will be the longest pedestrian suspension bridge, at 150m, in Australia and is being built at a height to

withstand the impact of flood events like that experienced in 2016.

It will also feature a special addition however the details of that will be announced at its official reveal, expected to be in late July.

There is no doubt that this pedestrian suspension bridge will be an iconic tourist feature in Latrobe while also enhancing the Wild Mersey MBT experience.

The former bridge, subject to Crown Land approval, will be reused at the weir at Bells Parade, providing another access to the walking tracks and open space of Pig Island.



Latrobe Council was recently approached to financially support the establishment of a parkrun at Bells Parade, Latrobe.
Unanimous in its support, Council eagerly awaits confirmation from another two local businesses to join collaboratively in this project as joint Foundation Sponsors. The course is proposed to start from near the amenities at Bells Parade where participants will run/jog/walk north along the coastal pathway 2.5kms and return. To effect a safe parkrun, the accesses from River Road to the Mersey River will be closed each Saturday from 8:30am until 10:00am.

The start date for the Bells Parade Latrobe parkrun is yet to be confirmed. Council congratulates the coordinating group on their initiative and looks forward to the Bells Parade, Latrobe parkrun continuing to provide for the health and wellbeing of our community.

HOW DOES YOUR GARDEN GROW?

It may be mid-winter but there are perennials to be divided, seeds to be sown and potted plants to go in, including deciduous trees and evergreens such as conifers.

WHAT TO SOW AND PLANT IN JULY:

ORNAMENTALS: Camellias (pots), calendula, carnation (seedlings), cerinthe, cineraria (seedlings), cornflower (seedlings), chrysanthemum (pots), cyclamen (pots), daphne (pots), deciduous shrubs and trees (bare-rooted or pots), delphinium (seedlings), echinacea, forget-me-not, freesia (bulb), hellebore (pots), hollyhock (seedlings), hyacinth (bulb), iceland poppy (seedlings), lilium (bulb), lobelia (seedlings), nemophila, pansy (seedlings), polyanthus (seedlings), poppy, primula (seedlings), rose (bare-rooted), viola (seedlings), wallflower (seedlings)

PLANT: Apricot (bare-rooted), apple (bare-rooted), artichoke (crown), Asian greens, asparagus (crowns), broad beans (seedlings), broccoli (seedlings), cabbage (seedlings), cherry (bare-rooted), chervil, comfrey, deciduous fruit trees (bare-rooted), early potatoes, english spinach, garlic (bulbs), grapevines (bare-rooted), horseradish (root cutting), kale, lettuce, mustard, nectarine (bare-rooted), onions, peach (bare-rooted), pear (bare-rooted), peas, plum (bare-rooted), rhubarb divisions, rosemary (pots), sage (pots), shallots, silverbeet, turnip

Sow seeds to get a head start on spring but it is too risky to put frost-sensitive plants such as tomatoes outside just yet. Also get deciduous plants into the ground and plant herbaceous perennials

ORNAMENTALS: Azalea, brown boronia (pots), camellias (pots), calendula, cannas (pots), carnation (seedlings), cineraria (seedlings), cornflower (seedlings), cyclamen (pots), daphne (pots), deciduous trees (bare-rooted or pots), delphinium

Divisions of chives, rhubarb, and asparagus crowns. Sturdy young seedlings of cabbage, cauliflower, celery, broccoli, lettuce, onion, and leeks.

SOW: Direct where they are to be grown seed of peas (including delicious snow peas), broad beans, turnips, swedes, Asian brassicas, English spinach, and onions. In warm, well-drained soil or containers, sow silverbeet, cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, and lettuce seeds.

CONTROLLING ASTHMA

Asthma is an inflammatory condition of the airways which restricts airflow and affects 66,000 Tasmanians or more than 1 in 8 people. Most people with asthma can experience good control of their condition however, without these practices, asthma can be fatal.

13.7% of the Latrobe Municipality have asthma. This is higher than both the national (11%) and state average (13%). Asthma is also one of the most common reasons for visiting the doctor or hospital in Tasmania. With more than 90% of hospitalisations for asthma in Tasmania being preventable, there is clearly much that can be done to support people with asthma in staying well.

Asthma Australia's goal is to halve hospitalisations due to asthma by 2030 by focusing on the consumer and the health system that surrounds them.

They provide meaningful support for people with asthma through a range of resources, information, and community initiatives and can forge new connections with health professionals as well as create events that bring people together to support each other.

HALL REDEVELOPMENT TO HOUSE BAND MOVE

A Memorandum of Agreement is being developed between Latrobe Council and the Latrobe Federal Band to relocate to the Latrobe Memorial Hall.

This agreement will see the site cater for the senior band, junior band, storage of band equipment, music library and administration.

There are some works that need to be undertaken with this project including building an extension onto the back of the hall and dropping the existing stage down to floor level. The latter ensures disability access requirements can be met without impacting on the useable space within the Latrobe Memorial Hall.

BIKING AND SHARED PATHWAY STRATEGY

The Latrobe Council is committed to improving cycling and walking facilities within our area, as we recognise cycling and walking are an important recreational and social activity for residents.

Off the back of the near completion of developments including the Wild Mersey Mountain Bike Trail and the Coastal Pathway, Council's attention now turns to maximising the utilisation of these community assets. With that in mind, Council is in the process of finalising draft Terms of Reference for a Biking and Shared Use Pathway Strategy.

Through identifying walking and cycling networks and addressing key barriers that deter people from these activities, Council hopes to transition to an environment and culture that supports locals and visitors alike to enjoy all the benefits of an active lifestyle within the Latrobe Council area. The Strategy will seek to identify key linkages where the provision of regionally significant additional infrastructure can better connect parts of our municipality. Since the opening of the Coastal Pathway at Bells Parade, we have seen a steady influx of people riding from Devonport to relax in Latrobe. Through the development of a strategy, Council hopes to identify how to better connect biking, walking and

The potential for the Strategy to be a collective effort in conjunction with the Kentish Council is also being investigated.

GO LEFT TO TURN RIGHT

The completion of the roundabout at Gilbert and Hamilton Street provides Hamilton Street motorists with increased frequency to access Gilbert Street as well as offering opportunities for traffic to utilise the roundabouts for U-turns. If you want to head in the opposite direction, you are more likely to get a quicker break in the traffic by turning left and using the roundabout, while also keeping other traffic moving. Likewise, if you are wanting to turn off

Likewise, if you are wanting to turn off Gilbert Street, rather than bank up traffic, use the nearest roundabout to make a Uturn, placing you on the side of the street that you want to be.

Consequently, the former stage will no longer be available to the community.

Due to bookings of the Latrobe Memorial Hall, works on this project will not commence until February 2022.

To continue to address staged activities within the Latrobe Memorial Hall, a portable stage system will be available along with an improved audio system in the main hall. The "Supper Room" and kitchen facilities will continue to be available for hire by whole of facility hirers, enabling ongoing diverse use by existing and potential groups without impacting on the Latrobe Federal Band's space and vice versa.

Motorists are reminded to be aware of traffic at roundabouts, especially cars in front of them as rear enders can be a predominant crash at such locations.
