

LATROBE FLOOD LEVEES PROJECT UPDATE

Construction for the flood mitigation works in Latrobe is nearing a start. There has been a great deal of background activity on this important project, working on the detail of the design, including interactions with those impacted by the upcoming works. It has only been in recent weeks that a final project start timeframe could be locked in. A key component of the design is the diversion culvert, designed to take flood flows out of Kings Creek at Kings Park and pass them under Gilbert Street and Cotton Street before entering the Mersey River. In addition, the flood levee along Cotton Street has been redesigned to rebuild Cotton Street on top of the new levee, reducing the impact on private land.

The levee works from near the Miles Ford Bridge and beside River Road past the Australian Axeman's Hall of Fame remain unchanged from the original design. There has also been much work ensuring the potential impacts of the critically endangered species of Central North Burrowing Crayfish. Two sites have been identified where new habitats will be created for translocation of any crayfish found

LAUNCH OF SUSPENSION BRIDGE AT WARRAWEE

The ambitious project to construct a 150m long suspension bridge across the Mersey River is now in the final stages. After some adjustments to the design, bought about by unfavourable site conditions, the two abutments and towers have been installed, ready for the bridge to be suspended.

Bridge Pro Engineering will spend the month of June hanging the bridge, using specialist machinery and winches to handle the cables weighing more than four tonnes each.

Once completed, trails will be constructed on either side to connect them to Shale Road for both riders and walkers to experience.

OFF SEASON CAMPAIGN

TASMANIAN MURAL TRAIL

Latrobe Council will contribute \$2,500 to sponsor a local artist to participate in the Tasmanian Mural Trail.

The Tasmanian Mural Trail will form part of the Davies Construction International Mural Fest in Sheffield from 6-11 November 2022.

This year Mural Fest will feature nine artists from around Tasmania who will be selected to paint a mural over the five-day period based on the theme 'The Place I Call Home'.

These murals will remain on display in Mural Park, Sheffield, for eleven months until the murals are relocated to the towns they represent, forming the 'Tasmanian Mural Trail'. This unique mural trail will begin and end in Sheffield and will showcase the special characteristics that towns around Tasmania call their own. The mural will be retained by Latrobe Council and erected in an appropriate place.

CAMP BANKSIA UPDATE

Work has started on stage one of the Camp Banksia redevelopment, with groundwork for the construction of the new cabins having commenced in mid-May and the Banksia Centre in mid-September. The building works are due for completion in April 2023.

PORT SORELL CARAVAN PARK

The contract for stage two of the redevelopment of the caravan park is being negotiated and will include a new caravan park caretaker's residence. The expected completion date for stage two is November 2022.

SPEED LIMIT CHANGE

The Department of State Growth has advised of a change to the speed limit on a 4.6-kilometre section of Mersey Main Road between Latrobe and Spreyton. The speed limit has been reduced to 70 km/h following a review of the speed limit after requests from the community. The speed limit change came into effect the week commencing 23 May. In making the decision to lower the speed limit, consideration was given to the characteristics of the road, including many curves, the high number of accesses to the road, and the crash history.

The reduced speed limit is expected to add only around 30 seconds to the average journey on this road.

KEEPING IT CLEAR

Are there fire hydrants, manholes and valves on your nature strip? While this area is generally owned by your local council, it's everyone's responsibility to keep any infrastructure on the nature strip (manholes, valves, and fire hydrants) clear of vegetation, debris, and landscaping products like plants, rocks, and bird baths.

DISTRACTED DRIVING

Distracted driving is a considerable risk to people riding bikes and other vulnerable road users.

The problem? People take their eyes off the road while driving a car too often. Driving a motor vehicle is a big responsibility and requires your full attention.

Each time a driver eats, drinks, or checks their phone, their driving abilities are compromised.

As technology has advanced, more devices have made their way into vehicles, either built into the control system or brought in by the driver, and they demand attention. When drivers are distracted, they are effectively 'travelling blind', which causes significantly large areas of the road space to become hazardous for others. And the longer a driver is distracted, the larger the area of road space compromised. A driver distracted for 2 seconds at 90km per hour is travelling blind for 50 meters. Remember to be aware of the roadway and watch out for cyclists. We all deserve to Arrive Alive.

BELLS PARADE PARKRUN

It's been quite a while since Council was first approached to sponsor the establishment of a parkrun in Latrobe, but the good news is that it is nearly here. 6 August has been tentatively set for the inaugural Bells Parade Latrobe parkrun. parkruns are free, weekly community events held all around the world where participants gather in open spaces and parks every Saturday morning to either walk, jog or run a five-kilometre course. It is not a race but rather a positive, allinclusive experience where you are only competing against yourself. The main goal is to get more physically active and maybe improve your time each week. With the development of the Coastal Pathway linking Bells Parade, Latrobe to Ambleside, the route was quickly identified, and some additional work was undertaken to ensure the event met parkrun's specific guidelines. It costs \$7,500 to establish a parkrun. An approach to Latrobe Council saw them enthusiastically commit the full funding. This was consequently reduced by undertaking the required works with the Apex Club of Latrobe and then funding the shortfall. Intercity Signs generously donated the road closure signage and the advance awareness sign at the turnaround point on the Coastal Pathway. While the event is free to participants, it is reliant on the generosity of volunteers who give their time. A core group has been involved in the establishment of this parkrun and has been training up with other local parkruns. Want to know more? MEMBERS SOUGHT FOR ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Following the completion of a review of the Port Sorell Advisory Committee's (PSAC) Terms of Reference and adoption in 2021, the new Committee appointments commenced in February 2022. The role of PSAC members is to consult with the community (or organisations they represent) on the development of the Port Sorell, Hawley and Shearwater areas. This can be on topics referred to the committee by Latrobe Council or issues that the representatives raise. COUNCIL HYDROTHERAPY POOL REOPENS

In 2019, the Latrobe Hydrotherapy Pool, owned by Uniting Agewell and leased to the Tasmanian Health Services, was closed by the Tasmanian Health Service, citing it was not financially sustainable for them to continue to provide.

Following extensive lobbying by Latrobe Council on behalf of users and the need to retain this service, the State Government provided \$400,000 in funding for necessary capital improvements.

The funding was provided on the basis that Latrobe Council would take over the ongoing provision of hydrotherapy rehabilitation services to the local area and associated operational costs.

After negotiating a lease with Uniting Agewell to operate the pool, the upgrades required were identified in consultation with rehabilitation service providers.

A large part of the redevelopment has been invested into creating efficiencies to assist in minimising operational costs for the pool so that it has the best chance to be financially sustainable for the Council. An energy-efficient heat pump heats the pool while instant gas hot water replaces the electric cylinder. Mayor Peter Freshney said, "The upgraded amenities will also enable multiple users to access the pool and that the facilities meet the level of assistance clients require for their mobility needs, including ceiling hoists and change tables".

Fairbrother Pty Ltd was consequently awarded the contract.

With some delays due to COVID-19, the redevelopment at 37 Moriarty Road, Latrobe, is now complete and open to the public.

Council has engaged Adrian and Carol-lyn Triffett to manage the Hydrotherapy Pool on its behalf. Bookings can be arranged by phoning 0428 296 641.

Council will monitor the operations of the facility for a period of time, particularly the public utilisation rates.

The Mayor added that "We need to ensure that the provision of hydrotherapy services does not create an ongoing impost on Latrobe ratepayers, but at the same time, we acknowledge the health benefits being provided to a wide cross-section of users."

CONSTRUCTION BEGINS ON MERSEY COMMUNITY HOSPITAL UPGRADE

Works have begun to expand the Mersey Community Hospital's Outpatient Clinic and Operating Theatres.

The upgrades, which form part of the Tasmanian Government's broader \$41.1 million redevelopment of the MCH, will deliver expanded space on the ground floor and level one to accommodate outpatients, operating theatres, and recovery.

A new Elective Day Surgery Centre will be established, which will allow for increased access to sub-specialty surgery and help to reduce the waiting times for a range of elective surgeries.

Facilities will include additional endoscopy, day surgery, theatre, and

IMPORTANT UPDATE – CALICIVIRUS (RHDV1-K5)

Landowners have primary responsibility for managing rabbits on their land, and Biosecurity Tasmania provides advice on rabbit control and regulates the release of the calicivirus. As a consequence of the ongoing good growing conditions, 2022 is proving to be another challenging year for rabbit control.

There is currently an abundance of food available, especially green grass, resulting in ideal conditions for rabbits to breed, meaning they are less likely to take calicivirus treated bait.

Young rabbits (up to 12 weeks) may develop immunity from calicivirus if exposed. The release of calicivirus in the presence of a large number of young rabbits, therefore, increases the risk of developing calicivirus immunity within rabbit populations.

Release principles include:

• When food is in abundance, especially green grass, rabbits are less likely to

PROBLEM WITH PLASTIC BAGS

Plastic bags are a convenient, lightweight, strong, cheap, and hygienic way to transport food and other products. Unfortunately, most plastics are made to be used once before being discarded. Australians throw away about 7,150 recyclable plastic bags a minute, with 429,000 recyclable plastic supermarket bags dumped into landfill every hour, with only 3% recycled. Once they are littered, plastic bags find their way onto our streets, parks, and waterways.

It's estimated that people consume the equivalent of a credit card of plastic every week, and it's expected that there will be more plastic than fish in the sea by 2050. Reducing our use of plastic bags is an important step towards a sustainable future. Each plastic bag you don't use represents resources saved for use by future generations.

We can all help reduce plastic bag litter by using alternative products, reusing our bags, recycling, placing litter in the bin, recovery suites, and will provide two new consulting rooms.

There were no releases of the calicivirus in Tasmania during 2021.

Pet owners are reminded that strains of calicivirus and other viruses, such as myxoma, are always present in the environment. There are reports of some wild rabbit populations currently being impacted by myxomatosis and RHDV2 (a

You just have to turn it on, and the machine will talk you through everything you need to do in simple steps. **USEFUL APPS**

The Ambulance Tasmania AED Locator smartphone app shows community-held AED locations across Tasmania. The app uses your phone's location to determine your closest AED. The app also includes an instructional video on how to use an AED, directions on how to perform CPR and manage an unconscious patient, and links to other useful sites and apps. SMOKE ALARMS SAVE LIVES

- You should install a smoke alarm in each sleeping area (bedroom), hallway and living area. Smoke alarms should be supported by a home fire escape plan.
- Test alarms monthly.
- Vacuum dust from alarms every six months.
- Replace batteries once a year. Some alarms have 10-year lithium batteries that do not need replacing every year.
- Mains powered smoke alarms also have backup batteries - check with the manufacturer if your model has batteries that need to be replaced regularly or whether it has a rechargeable battery.
- Young children are likely to sleep through the sound of a smoke alarm, so you must alert them to a fire and help them escape to safety.
- Installation of a smoke alarm is quick and easy. Follow the manufacturer's instructions. Generally, because smoke rises, mounting in the middle of the ceiling is recommended.
- Maximum protection can be gained from interconnecting smoke alarms when one smoke alarm operates, all connected alarms will operate.
- All alarms have a use-by date of 10 years, after this time, the entire alarm must be replaced.

AUSTRALIAN WARNING SYSTEM IMPLEMENTATION

Tasmania Fire Service (TFS) and Tasmania State Emergency Service (SES) Update – July 2022

The Australian Warning System (AWS) is a new national approach to information and warnings for hazards, including bushfire, flood, and storm. TFS and SES are responsible for the hazards of bushfire, flood, and storm, with the priority being on the implementation for the hazards of bushfire and flood in the first instance.

AWS has been designed based on community feedback and research across the country and aims to deliver a more consistent approach to warnings, no matter where you are. It uses a nationally consistent set of icons to show incidents on websites and social media, supported by calls to action and enhanced messaging.

Bushfire Warnings

For bushfire, changes to warnings, including national calls to action and enhancements to our warnings messaging, were implemented in Tasmania at the end of September 2021.

SES Flood Warnings

An SES Flood Warning System will be implemented for the hazard of flood from September 2022. This system complements the existing Bureau of Meteorology Flood Warnings, with SES warnings being all about what is the action the community needs to undertake to be safer.

DO NOT EAT WILD MUSHROOMS

The deadly Death Cap mushrooms (Amanita phalloides) have reappeared in East Launceston. Death Caps have previously been identified in Latrobe. The caps of the mushrooms are 40-160mm wide, usually pale green to yellow in colour, with distinctive white gills and white stems.

It has a membranous skirt on the upper part of the stem and a cup-like structure around the base of the stem (called a volva).



This species is not native to Australia, they were accidentally introduced from the northern hemisphere.

With mild, wet weather, we may see an influx of mushrooms. Death Cap mushrooms are often identified growing in leaf mulch near established oak trees, most commonly in the autumn months. Death Cap is a deadly, poisonous fungus that is responsible for 90% of all deaths related to mushroom consumption. Symptoms of Death Cap mushroom poisoning generally begin 6-24 hours after ingestion. Symptoms may subside for 1-2 days, giving a false impression of recovery. However, by this stage, the toxin may have already caused serious liver The warnings system has the following warning levels:

- Advice (Yellow) An incident has started. There is no immediate danger. Stay up to date in case the situation changes. This warning level may also be used to communicate a reduced threat to the community.
- Watch and Act (Orange) There is a heightened level of threat. Conditions are changing, and you need to start taking action now to protect you and your family.

• Emergency Warning (Red) - An Emergency Warning is the highest level of warning. You may be in danger and need to take action immediately. Any delay now puts your life at risk. damage. Liver failure and death may occur within 7-10 days.

Symptoms include nausea, vomiting, abdominal pain, diarrhoea, and hallucinations.

If you suspect that your or your child has eaten a poisonous mushroom, do not wait for symptoms to occur. Urgently contact the Poisons Information Centre on 131126 (2 hours a day, seven days a week). In an emergency, call 000 for an ambulance or seek urgent medical attention. If possible, take the whole mushroom with you for identification. *Source: Department of Health*

THINKING ABOUT ELECTRIC VEHICLES?

With fuel prices not expected to drop in the foreseeable future, some Tasmanians are looking at electric vehicles as a way to keep their weekly costs down. Electric Vehicles are any vehicle that uses electricity for propulsion. EV's include cars, bicycles, trucks, vans, aeroplanes, trains, motorbikes, buses, boats, and more. Although electric vehicles have been around for some time, many of us still do not know much about them.

Complicated to charge? Almost all electric vehicle owners do all of their recharging at home by basically plugging in an extension cord in their normal electrical outlet in their garage. You can't overcharge them; it is completely safe to leave them plugged in.

Expensive to maintain? With almost no moving parts other than the wheels, electric vehicles don't have the wear and tear that traditional vehicles do.

Would it leave me stranded? Just like a petrol vehicle, your electric vehicle has a

gauge that lets you know how much "fuel" you have left.

Less power than a regular vehicle? Electric vehicles accelerate faster than

Electric vehicles accelerate faster than petrol or diesel cars. As the charge on your vehicle gets lower than around 20%, you may notice a little less torque when accelerating

HOW TO HELP A DISPLACED PLATYPUS

If you see a displaced platypus, visit the Australian Platypus Conservancy (APC) website www.platypus.asn.au or contact your local wildlife rescue organisation for guidance before rescuing the animal.

A juvenile platypus typically emerges from its nesting burrow for the first time in midsummer when it's around 3-4 months old. First-year juveniles are far more likely to encounter a human on dry land, near a creek or river or in a puddle by the side of a road.

You are then faced with deciding what (if anything) should be done to assist the animal's survival. In some cases, a juvenile may be in genuine trouble and unable to survive without human intervention. This is particularly likely to be true for very small juveniles that have only recently emerged from a nesting burrow and are in poor condition. However, there have been cases when bright, healthy juveniles were removed from the wild when they were most likely just goofing around near their nesting burrow. In other cases - particularly in autumn or early winter - juveniles encountered far from the nearest surface water are most likely to be dispersing and engaged in normal, natural behaviour.

FUTURE OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT REVIEW

What's next? The board will now carefully consider the engagement feedback and other research and information to identify priority reform areas for further exploration in stage two.
