Small Business Survey

The Australian Securities and Investments Commission (ASIC) have undertaken to help small businesses understand and comply with their legal obligations.

As part of its consultation with small businesses, ASIC has launched an on-line survey and is seeking feedback to better understand what small business know and don't know about compliance obligations; assess if small business know where to find information about their compliance obligations, and receive feedback from small business about how ASIC can make compliance easier.

Tickets are only available from 7.00 pm on the night so don't forget to mark this performance in your diary as a must see. For more information, please phone 0448 92 2471.


Library Tales and More

Commitment to Safer Health Services

Tasmanian Health Organisation - North West (THO-North West) is reshaping services to improve patient safety. These changes were announced in October and will also provide resources to open a six bed Short Stay Unit within the busy Emergency Department (ED) at the Mersey Community Hospital (MCH).

Acting Chief Executive Officer, Gavin Austin, said THO - North West is reshaping its Paediatric and After Hours General Surgery services to ensure safe services can be provided for the region into the future.

"Community demand for emergency services is increasing at the Mersey Community Hospital Emergency

Department (ED) with over 26,000 patients treated each year currently.

The opening of the six bed Short Stay Unit will help reduce patient waiting times and provide a more effective structure to manage patients," Mr Austin said.

"As well as the opening of the six bed short stay unit, we are also increasing medical, nursing and clerical staff in the Emergency Department," he said.

A summary of changes to THO-North West Paediatric Services are -

- Children who arrive at MCH will be treated in a brand new six-bed Short Stay Unit within the ED.
- Paediatric patients at MCH will be cared for by both the THO-North West on-call Paediatrician and the Senior MCH Emergency doctor. If their condition worsens, they will be transferred to another hospital for ongoing care - in most cases this will be the THO-North West Paediatric Unit at the North West Regional Hospital (NWRH).

The changes have been based on clinical advice which acknowledges a shortage of Paediatricians willing to work in rural areas, making it difficult to sufficiently staff two paediatric wards so close together.

Almost 90% of paediatric patients are treated and discharged in the MCH ED. Just 5% of paediatric patients seen in the MCH ED are admitted, so comparatively few patients will be affected.

All Paediatric Outpatient Clinics will continue to operate at MCH.

This model of care is practiced in other regional hospitals and provides increased continuity of care which is one of the best ways for helping patients recover from illness more quickly.

The changes will make sure children will receive the safest and most appropriate care for their individual condition.

A summary of changes to THO-North West After-Hours General Surgery are -

- Patients who arrive at the MCH ED after-hours needing emergency surgery will be transferred to NWRH for their surgery.
- MCH will continue to maintain an on call theatre roster for emergency after hours surgery if required.
- After hours emergency caesareans will continue to be performed as part of the obstetric care provided at MCH.

These changes do not affect the services provided by the ED. Very few people currently present to the MCH ED needing after-hours emergency surgery.

"A coordinated approach makes sense so that we can provide the safest and best possible care to people across our entire region. Using resources effectively across the THO means we can continue to provide the community a range of services across the region in the longer term," said Mr Austin.

The changes have been supported by the THO-North West Governing Council, and the State and Commonwealth Governments.

The MCH Short Stay Unit was built as part of the State funded \$5.3 million Emergency Department redevelopment completed in January 2012.

Shearwater Park Outdoor Gym

Latrobe Council will be installing outdoor gym equipment at the northern section of Shearwater Park as a result of partial funding through the Healthy Communities fund provided by the Commonwealth Department of Health and Ageing. Each item will work out a specific section of the body. An instruction on use is included nearby.

Mayor Gaffney said "the installation of the outdoor gym equipment will provide another facet to the extensive walking track network that meanders along the Port Sorell foreshore and through reserves, adding to the opportunity for improving the fitness and health of users.

The equipment will be installed prior to Christmas (2012) and, along with the Under 5's playground nearby, will offer greater experiences in the great outdoors."

Food Safety Everyone's Responsibility

It is a requirement when preparing food for public consumption, that you are appropriately accredited to the level of food preparation you are undertaking.

While you make sandwiches and meals at home for your own family, they aren't going to challenge your credentials and bring a community organisation into disrepute should you give them food poisoning.

A **FREE** food safety skills and knowledge training for volunteers, temporary food stall operators and service groups is being provided by Latrobe Council's Environmental Health Officer, Mrs Glenys Nicholls at the Latrobe Council Chambers on Wednesday, November 28 from 5 pm until 7pm.

Pig Island New Off Leash Area

With a review of its Dog Management Policy, Latrobe Council recently agreed to extend the off leash areas in Latrobe to include Pig Island at Bells Parade.

To access this area, dogs must remain on their leash until they have crossed the footbridge at Bells Parade.

Dogs are still prohibited from being brought into the eastern side of Bells Parade, either on or off leash, with 'on the spot' fines issued for breaching this regulation.

There are many walking tracks, nooks and crannies for dogs to enjoy with their owners throughout Pig Island however dog owners are reminded that it is a requirement of the Dog Control Act that even in off leash areas, dogs must be under effective control at all times.

Please be mindful that other uses of this area may not be dog lovers and their enjoyment of walking these tracks should not be a bad experience as a result of an out of control dog.


and culture, youth legends, tourism as well as health and wellbeing.

Harriers in the Harvest

Take care 'the Harriers are in the harvest'.



As these avian carnivores begin their nest site selection and building during Spring, farmers are advised to be cautious when they are slashing, raking, baling or heading their crops.

Usually observed patrolling paddock or farm dam perimeters in a slow, low flying glide, Harriers are traditional swamp nesting Birds of Prey. They have now taken a liking to constructing their large ground nests in many agricultural crops, everything from barley to broad beans, grass hay, wheat and oats, pyrethrum and poppies, plus the occasional unproductive site.

Over the past 15 years, observational research of breeding patterns plus individual banding of offspring has been

undertaken by Latrobe naturalist Mr Peter Tonelli who submits the data to the Australian Bird and Bat Banding Scheme in Canberra.

"Various Harrier species throughout the world are doing it tough because their traditional marshland habitats are being converted to water storage dams or drained to increase land production. Although these special birds are not considered to be rare or threatened at the present, commercial cropping pressures and management disturbances at crucial incubation times appear to reduce the chances of yearly breeding successes," said Mr Tonelli.

Responding to Climate Change

Latrobe Council has participated in the Tasmanian Coastal Adaptation Decision Pathways (TCAP) project to develop long term responses to climate change in Port Sorell.

One of the thrusts behind the project was that communities can develop responses that manage risks while sustaining the high values that they place on the coastal environment as somewhere to live, work and play.

Another facet was to provide a better understanding of the options and their implications that can then be built into planning processes, infrastructure design and replacement, and private investment decisions.

Initiated by the Tasmanian Government and co-ordinated by the Local Government Association of Tasmania (LGAT), Council held an information night attended by approximately 100 members of the public with 40 members participating in the weekend workshops.

Council was also fortunate through the project to have LGAT commission the Water Research Laboratory (WRL) of the University of New South Wales to provide coastal engineering advice with regard to coastal protection and future climate change for the Port Sorell area.

The TCAP report and the WRL reports were received at Council's October meeting and are now available on Council's website for public viewing.

While protection of foreshore areas from erosion is not a direct responsibility of the Council, the community is looking to Council for leadership and direction on what is seen as an important issue.

The Council does not have the financial resources to implement the short and long term strategies detailed in the reports and agreed at the Council Meeting to request LGAT to lobby the Federal and State Government to modify the guidelines of the National Partnership Agreement on Natural Disaster Resilience to include works associated with the protection of built up coastal environments.

Look Before Actioning



Spring is always a busy time for wildlife rescue with chicks and joeys coming into care as a result of traffic collisions or cat and dog attacks. If you find young birds, please take time to observe the situation before rushing in to pick up fledglings.

Parent birds will feed chicks on the ground, or you may just be able to place them back in the nest or on a high branch out of the reach of predators. Nature is ruthless - kookaburras, currawongs, ravens, butcher birds and hawks predate on nestlings to feed their own young. This is all part of the web of life.

This delicate web however is now getting full of holes, with extinctions looming large for iconic species. Central North Wildlife Care and Rescue has been monitoring Masked Owls for nearly two years and there are increasing concerns that the numbers have dropped dramatically. Owls eat a lot of young rabbits, rats and mice and may be severely affected by eating animals poisoned by rodenticides. Loss of habitat (mainly tree hollows) and excessive lights and noise are also factors in low breeding success.
