CHANGE MAKERS RECOGNISED

The 2021 recipients were Peter Burk - Citizen of the Year; Aaliah Dennison - Young Citizen of the Year with the Community Event of the Year going to the Latrobe Football Club, represented by Greg Donald.

Mr Burk, whom many readers will know as their local butcher at Morse's Butchery in Latrobe, received recognition for his tireless contribution to community. Not only financially by sponsoring many clubs and organisations but also actively through the Lions Club of Latrobe where he has held many positions and coordinated and supported a multitude of activities and the North West Hound Owners Association. Peter is also active with the Latrobe Bowls

Corporate Challenge and Devonport Tenpin Bowling. Aaliah Dennison received this recognition for not only her academic achievements but leadership in the community and sporting achievements. Aaliah was Latrobe High School

Captain in 2020, received various awards for academia and was a numeracy leader for younger students.

She has been a competitive gymnast and gives back to this passion by coaching gymnastics. Aaliah also regularly volunteers with the Port Sorell parkrun, is an AFL Boundary Umpire, a member of the Devonport Touch Football Association and participated at the National level in school track and field, being recognised as an Australian Olympic Change-Maker.

The Latrobe Football Club was recognised for the tremendous amount of work that went in to participating in the NWFL's 2020 being the first club to host a game last season and also host of the seniors games in the finals.

STAYING CLOSE TO YOUR ROOTS

They say farming and living on the land is in the blood. So, it's no surprise that retired farmers Francis Hardwicke and Bruce Cocker both live at Strathdevon, Latrobe - and both are very happy there!

Francis, 93, has five children, lots of grandchildren and farmed beef cattle, milking cows and vegies at Sunnyside, Railton.

The widower says he had a great life but growing up on the land was tough. "Dad was a hard man and mum was a very strong woman, and both would give you a clip around the ear for giving them any cheek," he says. "You ate what was in front of you and did your chores!" Milking wasn't sophisticated like it is today. "When I was hand milking the cows,



sometimes I would get a kick and the bucket would spill over, and then I got into trouble from mum!" Francis explains.

Bruce is a bachelor who was born on the family farm at Lower Barrington and lived there for 42 years, running it after his parents died. He farmed dairy cows and grew potatoes.

Selling the farm due to ill health, a fall saw Bruce eventually moved into Strathdevon.

Bruce spends most of his time

listening to "hillbilly music" and regularly going to Sheffield with a Red Cross Volunteer to catch up with his mates at the pub. "I don't get up early anymore," Bruce says "and I enjoy the food and the company here at Strathdevon. I couldn't have managed on my own."

DOG OBEDIENCE TRAINING

The second course of Dog Obedience Training at Latrobe will commence on Sunday, 2 May.

This 6-week course is open to puppy's and dog over 6 months of age with little or no prior training. It is an excellent way of developing trust with a rescued or rehomed dog.

Your role in this class is to use the knowledge imparted during the sessions and continue this training each day, at home and in a secure and safe environment for the duration of the course.

Cost is \$22 with numbers limited to provide effective instruction for attendees. Successful course participants will receive a Canine Obedience Certificate, entitling them to discounted dog registration with Latrobe Council in subsequent years.

MINIMISING FLOOD RISK IN LATROBE

The severity of the June 2016 flood event and its impact on Latrobe triggered a high level of concern amongst Councillors, residents and commercial property owners regarding the flood protection of the Latrobe township.

Council consequently engaged one of the world's most experienced specialist water consulting firms, Entura, to conduct a flood analysis and develop options to protect the Latrobe township from future flooding at a level experienced in June 2016. On receipt of the Entura report "Minimising Flood Risk in Latrobe - Hydraulic Modelling and Levee Options Assessment Report - 1 June 2018" Council undertook extensive public consultation. At its August 2018 meeting, Council confirmed its intention to progress Option D, being the most inclusive option, the preference of the community and, at that time, estimated to cost \$5m. \$3.4m from the Federal Government, \$1m from the State Government and \$600k from Latrobe Council was allocated to the project.

Entura subsequently completed a detailed design which was presented to Council in April 2020. This presentation provided an updated potential cost estimate for the project totalling \$9.5 million. Some of the estimated major cost variations from the original prices were:

A summary of the excluded costs is:

- Gilbert Street stormwater bypass approximately \$1 million.
- Rehabilitation landscaping involving 7,700 plants is \$230k.
- A mobile pump amounting to \$200k.
- Land acquisition subject to individual landowner negotiations but estimated at \$240k.
- The main existing service relocation is the sewer at 26-38 Gilbert Street, estimated at \$150k.
- Approval fees, tendering and construction management could be 2% of the construction cost (depending on staging and the construction period).

As the design had been completed and the permits were progressing, Council agreed to proceed with the tender process hoping that the revised cost estimates were "conservative" and that construction could commence during the 2020-21 summer period.

The tenders were consequently advertised in August 2020 with five received. All were significantly higher than the total project costs, amounting to approximately \$14m

Council recently held discussions with both tiers of government and are awaiting their formal advice regarding the provision of additional financial support.

2021-22 SMALL GRANTS OPEN

Latrobe Council's annual small grants open for application from 1 March for projects starting from 1 July and concluding no later than 30 June 2022. There are two opportunities for funding - **EMERGING NEEDS GRANTS** are designed to encourage community partnerships that address an unmet need within the Latrobe Municipality in the fields of minor capital works, health and community welfare, environment as well as sport and recreation.

ARTS, CULTURE AND FESTIVAL SPONSORSHIP nurtures new or established events and major festivals that comply with COVID-19 restrictions and build our cultural identity, support accessibility and deliver a diverse range of community arts and cultural activities within the Latrobe Municipality, assisting them towards self-sustainability.

CONSULTATION ON PARKING AND SPEED HUMPS ALONG SOUTH ESPLANADE

A concept plan to install defined parking bays, bollards and improve parallel parking capacity on the river side of South Esplanade, between properties 1-11, includes the installation of three speed humps, and is subject to community feedback.

The works initially included the construction of 4 x 90 degree sealed parking bays catering for a maximum of 12 vehicles, each having minimal impact on the existing vegetation.

The widening of the road with a gravel shoulder will better define parallel parking options.

Following a concern at the speed of vehicles along this stretch of road, and engineering judgement supporting the effectiveness of speed humps in preference to reducing the speed limit and associated policing required for the latter, the concept has expanded to include the installation of three speed humps in front of 2, 7 and 11 South Esplanade.

This project seeks to -

- 1. Address an increased need for defined parking in this area;
- Protect the vegetation and subsequently the vista of the riverbank from the impact of vehicles;
- 3. Reduce the speed of motorists along this section of South Esplanade;
- 4. Safely cater for vehicles reversing from the parking bays and
- 5. Make the route a safer one for pedestrians and cyclists.


Stage 1 includes the installation of 2 sealed parking bays, associated bollards and the three speed humps at a cost of \$30,700. Stage 2, at a cost of \$35,360, includes the

installation of the balance 2 sealed parking bays inclusive of a clearway to maintain access to the river, the widening of the road for parallel parking and associated bollards.

All up, the works cover a distance of 250m.

Stage 1 is currently budgeted for this financial year with Stage 2 requiring a budget allocation for the 2021-22 financial year. Subject to timing and resourcing it is possible that both stages may be combined.

Each year, Council is faced with the task of assessing and prioritising the many worthwhile projects that have been identified within the community. Council lists each project, assesses it against a common set of objective criteria and prioritises the project with a view to scheduling projects over Council's longterm planning period - currently ten years. Submissions made in recent years have been recorded on Council's database so there is no need to repeat those submissions however please feel free to provide any relevant updates. Submissions should include sufficient detail to enable Council to understand:

- The location and scope of the project;
- The estimated cost of the project;
- The perceived benefits of the project including any risk/safety issues, social/community impact and environmental impacts;
- Any other relevant information to enable Council to make an informed decision.

PLANNING FOR ANZAC DAY ACTIVITIES

At the time of writing, both the Port Sorell and Latrobe ANZAC Day Dawn Services will be proceeding at 6:00am on 25 April but will not include marching.

The exclusion of marching comes at the request of RSL Tasmania due to the inability of participants to maintain the required physical distancing during such an activity. Attendance at the Dawn Services will be capped at 1,000 to comply with gathering restrictions. This should not impact too much on the Services given that past attendance figures indicate less than 1,000 attendees. In short, if you don't normally attend these Dawn Services, please don't start this year.

On the other hand, more than 1,000 people traditionally attend the 10:00am Latrobe Citizens Commemorative Service therefore Council are currently working with Business Tasmania for a permit to conduct this Service.

At this point in time, this Service will not include the regular March from the Latrobe RSL, as per the advice of RSL Tasmania, and the occasion will look a little different in what is required of attendees to maintain 1.5m physical distancing between non same household people.

The Latrobe Court House Museum will be holding a special exhibition on ANZAC Day that will feature a brave Tasmanian, Stanley Hallam, who died on the Thai-Burma Railway.

This will be open immediately following the Latrobe Citizens Commemorative Service and remain open until 12 noon. The Latrobe Courthouse Museum is located at the Latrobe Post Office Reserve, entry signage will be visible. A cuppa and ANZAC biscuit will also be available. All are welcome.

The Latrobe Football Club continues to plan its ANZAC Day game at the Latrobe Recreation Ground, commencing at 12 noon. There are potential changes to the teams in this year's competition so stay tuned for further details about this game.

DUMPED GARDEN WASTE AND RUBBISH ON VACANT BLOCKS

It has been observed that a number of residents are dumping their lawn clippings and pruned vegetation along with general waste over their back fence, on bush land, or on a neighbouring vacant property. Please be reminded this is littering and fines are applicable if people are caught.

NEW HOME FOR BAND



Over the years, Latrobe Council has been working with the Latrobe Federal Band to identify a more suitable and practical home for them away from the Latrobe

Recreation Ground. After a couple of false starts, the Latrobe Memorial Hall has been identified as a good fit.

Use of the hall has significantly decreased in recent times with major events choosing other facilities to host shows and performances. This has created the opportunity for the band to move in permanently, occupying the stage and part of the supper rooms.

Council has worked with the Latrobe Federal Band over the last three months and, with the assistance of Tasmanian Consulting Services, has developed a plan to refurbish the hall to accommodate the needs of the band.

With the band moving into the hall, there will be some changes as to how this venue can be used, with the stage and one half of the supper room no longer available for hire. Stage alternatives are being investigated subject to demand. Large scale events will still be accommodated but with reduced accessibility. With the availability of Hamilton Hub at 20 Hamilton Street as a meeting space, the supper rooms are not being used to the level they once were. It is anticipated that once in the Hall the band will be able to have pop up performances and increase their visibility in the community, possibly attracting new members and strengthening their presence in our community.

LIGHTS RAISE AWARENESS

Throughout the year, Council is asked by many health-related organisations to "light up" facilities to raise awareness of various campaigns. With the ability to change the colour of lights on the Bass Highway tree, near The Cherry Shed, Council is more than happy to participate in these worthy campaigns where possible.

On 24 March the tree will be lit in red to raise awareness for Tuberculosis (TB). 2020 has reminded us that infectious diseases like COVID-19 and tuberculosis (TB) do not respect borders.

More than 1500 people in Australia suffer from tuberculosis each year with it transmitted via droplets expelled when a sick person coughs or sneezes.

While TB is both treatable and curable, what is more alarming is that 1 million people in Australia are estimated to be infected with the dormant form of TB. Signs of active TB include coughing for more than three weeks, losing weight rapidly, coughing blood and night sweats. To find out more about TB, consult your doctor

From 26-28 March, the tree colour will switch to yellow in support of recognition and awareness of Endometriosis. Endometriosis is a common disease in which the tissue that is like the lining of the womb grows outside it in other parts of the body.

More than 830,000 of Australian women suffer from endometriosis at some point in their life. Symptoms vary but commonly include pelvic pain that puts life on hold around or during a woman's period. It can damage fertility.

ERADICATING RICE GRASS

Rice Grass is a threat to the health of the Rubicon Estuary. It spreads rapidly and is a troublesome aquatic weed. It is a threat to boat access for fishing, recreation and aquaculture and impacts on fish and shorebird habitat, traps sediment and restricts tidal flow.

Weed contractors have commenced

the Rubicon Estuary with follow-up treatment at Narawntapu National Park. Initial weed treatment is continuing in a southerly direction at North East Arm and Brown's Creek towards the Rice Grass containment line at Eagle Point. Rice Grass control has been delayed due to wet and windy weather as spraying can only be done at low tide and in light wind conditions. Rice Grass treatment on the western side of the estuary at Port Sorell and Squeaking Point commenced in mid-February and will continue through March. Want to know more? PROTECTING LITTLE PENGUINS

A new citizen science-based toolkit was recently launched.

Funded by the Tasmanian Government and developed by CCA's Natural Resource Management (NRM) team, the toolkit will help land managers and community groups monitor Tasmania's Little Penguin populations and manage threats to their colonies.

The toolkit provides guidance on survey methods that can be used to monitor changes to penguin populations in their local area.

It also provides methods to assess the Little Penguin habitat potential of an area, as well as ways to effectively assess current and future threats to colonies. Locally, Little Penguins can be found at the Carbuncle, along Larooma Track at the northern end of Hawley Beach. This is a conservation area where dogs are NOT permitted. At this time of the year, snakes are also abundant so please be vigilant. The toolkit is available at www.dpipwe.tas.gov.au/toolkit

HOW DOES YOUR GARDEN GROW?

Continuing on from the last edition, the following planting and sowing guide details what and when to plant specific to our coolclimate conditions during March and April.

March heralds the milder days of autumn. Start planting potted shrubs and trees including native plants into prepared garden beds. Seeds for winter and spring crops can be sown in punnets or trays for transplanting into gardens in April.

WHAT TO SOW AND PLANT IN MARCH:

ORNAMENTALS: Alyssum, baby blue eyes, bluebell (bulb), calendula, canterbury bells, carnation, cineraria, columbine, cornflower, delphinium, dianthus, english daisy, forget-me-not, freesia (bulb), gaillardia, godetia, hollyhock, honesty, iceland poppy, japanese windflowers (pots), jonquil (bulb), lobelia (seedlings), pansy (seedlings), polyanthus, primula, rose (barerooted), sasanqua camellia (pots), scabiosa, stock, succulents (pots), viola, wallflower

PLANT: Garlic cloves and seedlings of celery, kale, cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, winter lettuce, silverbeet, spring and salad onion, chives and leeks.

SOW: Beetroot, carrot and parsnip early in March only. Then turnip, English spinach, broadbeans, peas (frost-free districts only), Asian leaf and root vegetables, spring and salad onions, lettuce and into vacant beds, green manure crops. Begin broccoli plantings in March through to July. With so much autumn colour around in April, this is a good time of the year to select potted deciduous trees and shrubs for planting. Also view roses in flower to select appealing varieties for planting.

Trees are a valuable part of our ecosystem and a benefit to all members of the community but the value of trees goes beyond this.

Trees deliver health and wellbeing benefits and can encourage exercise as well as providing an element of safety for walkers near roadsides. Street trees are also known to absorb airborne pollutants, helping to reduce air pollution, and can aid mental health and stress management.

Trees make environmental contributions by helping improve climate and reduce the "urban heat island effect". The temperature of a canopy's shaded area can be reduced by up to 10-25°C. Trees can also intercept stormwater runoff and promote soil infiltration, thus helping reduce stormwater related issues. Trees enhance the social life of cities by contributing to lower crime rates, reducing traffic speeds, and reducing the perception of time spent waiting for public transport. These are some of the many reasons our trees are an important part of our community.

The Latrobe Tree Planting Committee has established a Significant Tree Register to recognise and protect the significant trees of our municipality. Trees can be significant for several reasons, including scientific, social, historic, or aesthetic characteristics of significance.

If you know of a tree you believe should be recognised and protected in this way, a nomination form can be found on Council's website or in the office.

PORT SORELL HISTORY TRAIL

Members of the Port Sorell History Group are busy designing signs for placement along the walking track and other historical sites in the Port Sorell area. There are many stories to be told of life in the early days - of Aborigines, timber harvesters, trading vessels, shipbuilders, bushrangers, murders, smuggling, shipwrecks and the enterprise and the resilience of those early settlers. To take a snapshot of one small area, let's look at Panatana Rivulet. Did you know that?

It was once called Marshy Creek before the well-known name of Muddy Creek
The first ship built on the North West
Coast, the "Pickwick", was constructed where the paddling pool is today.
In 1847, a small wooden mill and mill dam were built on the eastern side of the creek.
A low lying intra-tidal bridge was built across the creek. At low tide two parallel spars are often visible.

Until the 1980's, it was the favourite place to swim and on Summer days would be crowded with swimmers. In the 1920's, there were two diving springboards and a water slide on the eastern side.

The footbridge was built in 1937, to enable

The footbridge was built in 1937, to enable children to attend the new Port Sorell School, at that time located in Wilmot Street, almost opposite the Port Sorell Cricket Club.

POSITIVE RESPONSE TO NEW NORTH WEST BUSES

There has been a positive response to the new bus routes and timetables across the North West which began on 17 January, with no significant problems identified and passengers reporting an improved experience.

The State Growth team was on the ground at key interchanges leading up to the new network with the overwhelming response being that the changes were long overdue. Latrobe is now serviced by routes 178 between Devonport and Latrobe via Spreyton and 184 between Devonport and Sheffield via Latrobe.

Service frequency has been increased with a new two-hourly service on Sundays and route simplification.

Port Sorell is serviced by route 184 - Port Sorell to Devonport via Wesley Vale - with changes to the route direction.


Weekday services at Port Sorell were reduced due to low patronage however the weekend timetable has increased services to six on both Saturday and Sunday.

The previous route 85 Hospital Link service has been replaced by a more frequent route 708 North West Express linking central Devonport and Burnie seven days a week.

The new North West Express service also stops in Penguin and Ulverstone, is hourly in each direction on weekdays and Saturdays, and two-hourly on Sundays.

Services between Burnie, Devonport, Launceston and Hobart have also been improved. For more information on routes and timetables, go to

FENCED IN

Planning on erecting a fence? Did you know that there are certain requirements that need to be met?

In the General Residential zone, you do not need a permit for the construction of a front fence that is either;

- No more than 1.2m above ground level if the fence is solid; or
- No more than 1.8m if the fence has openings above a height of 1.2m which provides a uniform transparency of not less than 30% (excluding any posts or uprights)

'Uniform transparency' means that the fence has a level of visibility through the fence and that visibility is the same for the whole length of the fence.

Fences higher than 1.2m at or near the frontage of a property which are not transparent may present a safety hazard for motorists and pedestrians as they may block lines of sight.

Side and rear fences can have a maximum height of 2.1m and there is no requirement for a transparent section.

The height must be reduced within 4.5m of the front boundary to comply with the requirements for front fences (see above).

Fences located on corner lots may need to take into consideration safety matters such as visibility for vehicles at an intersection. Before constructing a front fence on a corner lot, please contact Council's planning officers for advice.

Additionally, if you wish to build a fence outside the parameters outlined above, you must submit a planning application to Council for assessment.

Responsibility for the erection of fencing between boundaries is governed by the Boundary Fences Act, 1908. Council does not have a role in the administration of the Act.

KEEP BUS STOPS CLEAR

With the new Sunday bus services to Latrobe and Port Sorell and buses operating over more hours in Latrobe, the Department of State Growth reminds residents not to park in bus stops at any time of the day.

To ensure that passengers can get on and off the bus safely, and so buses have enough space to get in and out of a stop, it is illegal to park in a bus stop and drivers must not stop within 20 metres before a bus stop sign or 10 metres after the sign. Please drive and park safely, and keep bus stops clear.
