### **SUPER COUNCIL AN OPTION**

Since late 2021, the Local Government Board, established by the Tasmanian Government, has been reviewing how councils work to enable the Board to make recommendations to the government on how councils need to change so they can develop and maintain the capability that communities want while delivering services locally, keep jobs in local communities, and ensure that all Tasmanians have a strong voice in decisions being made on their behalf. The Board have stated that the status quo cannot remain, but the sort of change required is unlikely to be voluntary.

To stimulate discussion, nine catchment areas that align with data reflecting how Tasmanians live, work and access services in their community were identified. Criteria associated with these scenarios are place and representation, future needs and priorities, financial sustainability and operational capability.

Specific to Latrobe Council, the Board has identified it within the Cradle Coast catchment along with the Kentish, Devonport, Central Coast, Burnie and Wynyard-Waratah Council areas. Information packs detailing how this catchment was determined are accessible at <a href="https://bit.ly/CradleCoastCatchment">https://bit.ly/CradleCoastCatchment</a> and detail four proposed scenarios for new local government boundaries and service delivery models, specifically:

### • Scenario 1 - Establishing two separate councils

Council A being the existing Burnie Council area plus a part of the Central Coast Council west of the Leven River. Council B combines the existing Latrobe, Kentish, Devonport and balance of the Central Coast Council east of the Leven River.

### • Scenario 2 - Establishing three new council areas

Council A being the existing Burnie Council plus Somerset; Council B being the existing Central Coast Council plus south of Cethana and Moina; Council C a combined Latrobe, Devonport and eastern part of the Kentish Council (minus the areas south of Gowrie Park).

- Scenario 3 Establishing a single Cradle Coast Council consisting of the existing Latrobe, Kentish, Devonport, Central Coast and Burnie Councils.
- Scenario 4 Establishing two councils

Council A to be an amalgamation of the existing Burnie, Central Coast and Devonport Councils and Council B to be an amalgamated Latrobe and Kentish Council.

The Local Government Board has published surveys so you can provide feedback on the scenarios as well as any other relevant ideas for how councils might operate to better serve their communities in the future. Surveys must be lodged by Thursday, 6 July. ### 2023-24 BUDGET ADOPTION

Since February, Latrobe Council's Finance team have been leading the process of defining what the Council's 2023-24 Budget will include. Each year, this process starts with everyone's wish list, including projects sought by the community. It then progresses through the rigorous process of being prioritised to fit within the Council's resource capacity to deliver the projects correlating to their benefit to the community. There are also set costs that Council must meet annually. This collective process determines whether a rate increase is required or not. Council's 2023-24 Budget was adopted in June, with rate notices scheduled to be received by households throughout July. ### OPEN SPACE, SPORT AND RECREATION PLANNING

The collation of a draft strategy to provide Latrobe Council with a long-term direction for the planning and management of the open space network throughout the municipality for the next ten years is nearing completion.

The key objectives of the Open Space, Sport and Recreation Plan include improved planning and maintenance of grounds and facilities; their sustainability and management; improving their distribution, mix, and use while ensuring liveability through access by the community.

Once complete, the draft strategy will be released for further public comment. This is expected to occur during July-August. Based on the information received from this consultation, a final report will be presented to Council for consideration, adoption and implementation later in the year. ### LATROBE CBD MASTERPLAN

Council intends to undertake a Latrobe Central Business District (CBD)

Masterplan to guide the future development of the CBD with consideration to traffic management, connectivity and amenity.

Along with Gilbert Street, the project scope will extend to include Kings Park and its associated car park, Station Square car park, Cotton Street and Kobie Lane.

### PLANBUILD TASMANIA

PlanBuild Tasmania allows anyone to enter an address in their portal to see what planning zones and codes apply to their property. A Property Report is then generated, which includes maps, details of the planning zone, codes and other information that affects the selected property.



For those properties that fall under the Tasmanian Planning Scheme, PlanBuild Tasmania provides a comprehensive guided enquiry service, including identifying planning, building and plumbing rules that may apply to a proposed project, enabling you to work through a series of questions on your proposed project resulting in information on:

- who to consult (e.g. local council, Heritage Tasmania)
- who can do the work (e.g. a licensed builder)
- what to apply for (e.g. a permit). After completing an enquiry, if you have additional questions or want to request advice from a council, this can be lodged online using PlanBuild Tasmania. To start an enquiry or learn more about PlanBuild Tasmania, visit planbuild.tas.gov.au.

### **BALDOCK MEMORIAL WORKS**

Plantings at the Darrel Baldock Memorial at the Latrobe Recreation Ground in Gilbert Street, Latrobe have recently been rejuvenated by Council's Green Spaces team.

Additionally, the lighting has been repaired, enabling improved visibility of this tribute during darker hours.

The Darrel Baldock Memorial includes interpretive panels detailing Mr Baldock's life predominately in football with the Latrobe and St Kilda Football Clubs, as a parliamentarian and with various hobbies.

### LATROBE FLOOD MITIGATION WORKS NEARING COMPLETION

The Latrobe Flood Mitigation works are progressing well. The connection of the culvert from Kings Park to its discharge point onto farmland beyond Cotton Street was made in May with all road sealing and footpath reinstatement completed in June. The crossing of Gilbert Street went well and was completed quicker than programmed.

There has been some concern that the slope of Cotton Street, especially at the corner with Victor Street, falls towards the river. While disconcerting for those driving more than 50 kms, the design complies within Australian design standards. The concrete footpath along the highest point of the levee protects the levee from scour damage in an extraordinary overtopping flood event. Motorists travelling towards Gilbert Street, along Victor Street, are reminded to Give Way to all approaching traffic at the Victor Street bridge over Kings Creek.

Subject to weather conditions, the Station Square carpark should be resealed by the time you read this newsletter.

With the work significantly impacting on Sheean Memorial, BridgePro Engineering has remediated the site by removing vegetation, installing an aggregate exposed base to the Memorial to complement the circular installation, reinstalled the seating, created a bollard barrier between the Memorial and driveway to the units alongside as well as poured a coloured footpath to draw the eye to the Memorial, further raising awareness of this significant tribute to Edward Sheean VC. The Memorial will soon be further added to - refer to separate article.

Works along River Road, Latrobe are nearing completion. Access and egress at the northern entrance has been completed and include a concrete entry that will act as a spillway if ever required. The same surface works are now being effected at the exit road from Bells Parade.

There will also be a widening of the entry to Thompson's Park to improve access to car parking in this space when opened for large, community events at Bells Parade. At all other times, this will be closed to enable the site to be safely used as an off-leash dog exercise area.

The Atkinson Park levee is nearing completion and will include the reinstallation of the former gazebo. Unfortunately, parking at this reserve has been reduced due to the footprint of the flood levee and now includes limited parallel parking along River Road. Treloar Civil continues to work in the Kings Park area to complete the earth levee. As a result, some areas remain inaccessible.

BridgePro Engineering has mobilised to the area near the Latrobe Pigeon Club on Gilbert Street, south of the Miles Ford Bridge where they are commencing works on the Mersey Pump Station and TasWater levee. This is the final part of the project with this carpark and water access unusable by the public during construction.

An Interim Emergency and Flood Response Plan remains in place for implementation during the construction phase if required.

### **NEW FOOD VAN POLICY**

Council personnel are working on the establishment of a food van policy.

While mobile food vendors are registered statewide, their ability to trade on public land in a Local Government area is determined by that local council.

Currently, mobile food vans not involved in an event can apply to Latrobe Council to set up at selected locations in the Latrobe

Council area subject to compliance with various conditions.

The new policy seeks to identify and licence mobile food vans to trade at specific sites.

In consideration of competition with permanent food businesses, consideration is being given as to whether to continue to require applicants to obtain a letter of agreement from a competing food business if within 200m of them.

### **HMAS ARMIDALE MEMORIAL**

Unfortunately, Commonwealth funding for expanding the existing Sheean Memorial to include the HMAS ARMIDALE story was unsuccessful on this occasion.

Consequently, Council has sought the funds committed by the Tasmanian Government to upgrade the site with a Sheean statue, potentially atop the existing circular Memorial and, if funds allow, a plaque detailing the fight for the Victoria Cross to its final achievement.

The council is appreciative of those that contributed their thoughts on what could

potentially be included in the expanded HMAS ARMIDALE Memorial and will continue to progress toward an appropriate design, including critical elements of submissions, for a further application for Commonwealth funding however it is unlikely to be in the 2023-24 financial year.

### LATROBE HYDROTHERAPY POOL HOURS

In 2019 the Tasmanian Health Service ceased hydrotherapy pool services at 37 Moriarty Road, Latrobe.

Following a public outcry for the reopening of the pool, Latrobe Council ultimately stepped into this space of health service provision and took on the lease of the Hydrotherapy Pool after an offer of funding of \$400,000 from the Tasmania Government to upgrade the facility to suit the needs of users better. The Latrobe Hydrotherapy Pool reopened in 2022. With the water temperature maintained at 34°C and disability access, the pool is therapeutic to those recovering from mobility-impaired conditions.

The Latrobe Hydrotherapy Pool is currently open Monday to Friday from 9:00am until 12 noon and 1:00pm until 4:00pm. Day-to-day management is contracted to Deep Water Swim School. Bookings can be made by phoning 0428 296 641. No referral is required.

Council have listened to the community's desire for a later closing time for this facility to enable working people with health issues to access the remedial benefits of hydrotherapy.

With the management tender under review, Council is considering the expansion of open hours.

### LATROBE RECREATION GROUND UPGRADE

Scoping and design plans for the redevelopment of the Latrobe Recreation Ground in Gilbert Street, Latrobe are underway for the construction of -

- expanded and modernised change room and toilet amenities to provide for greater use and accessibility for all;
- a redeveloped Latrobe Federal Band room to allow for new senior and junior rehearsal rooms along with new public amenities and
- upgraded grandstand seating.

As one of the Council's five priority projects identified through the planning of the broader Latrobe Recreation Precinct, Council has successfully secured \$500,000 in funding for this project from the State Government's Improving the Playing Field Grant Program.

Additionally, the Federal Government publicly committed funding of \$500,000 as part of their last election campaign. Council is working towards construction commencing later this year.

Many cat owners are unaware of how far their cat wanders from home. A project that tracked 11 domestic cats in the north-west of Tasmania showed that the average outdoor domestic cat roams an area of 1.4 hectares around their home.

That means they can visit 14 neighbouring properties a week and could potentially become a nuisance to some of your neighbours.

Cats become a nuisance by -

- scent marking and defecating around neighbours' properties.
- fighting with other neighbourhood cats or agitating neighbours' dogs
- yowling during the night
- creating traffic hazards while darting across roads
- hunting wildlife on neighbouring properties

### **BANKSIA FACILITIES**

Access to the Banksia Centre has returned to the front entry on Pitcairn Street.

The office, previously located at the Camp in Anderson Street, is now located in the Banksia Centre, with Port Sorell U3A having a new, dedicated space alongside. The redevelopment has expanded the front foyer to enable displays and the congregation of groups attending functions within the soon-to-be-completed Performing Arts Centre.

Access to the stadium and two meeting rooms is now from the Pitcairn Street entry. Redevelopment works are progressing on the landscaping and community play space, with the site due to be entirely handed over to Latrobe Council in September.

### WATER MAIN WORKS IN APPLEBY ROAD

Appleby Road residents are receiving a long-awaited water main upgrade as TasWater works to replace 1400 metres of infrastructure.



After multiple breaks and outages, extensive investigations and a detailed design process were undertaken to inform the ideal long-term solution.

"The water main has reached the end of its useful life, and we are pleased to be making this upgrade," Community and Stakeholder Engagement Specialist Nikita Heazlewood said.

"These outages are frustrating for those impacted, and we appreciate the patience shown by the residents along Appleby Road while we worked to find the best solution for now and into the future."

Oliver Kelly Group commenced work on the water main in early June, with the renewal expected to be completed by late July 2023.

All road users should note that traffic management is in place around the work site.

### PARKING ON FOOTPATHS AND NATURE STRIPS

Tasmania Police have observed an increase in the number of parking complaints received, particularly concerning parking motor vehicles on footpaths throughout the Latrobe Council area.

Acting Sgt Medhurst said, "an increase in residential housing density and vehicles on our roads presents us with increased challenges regarding safe vehicle parking. Motorists and residents are reminded that parking wholly or partially over a footpath is an issue of public safety and is an offence where a fine of \$90.50 can be issued. Parking on nature strips is also prohibited." Latrobe Police encourage everyone to ensure that they park their vehicles safely and legally to avoid receiving a fine.

### BASS HIGHWAY UPGRADE PLAN DETAIL RELEASED

Tasmania's North West is a highly productive region of Tasmania with the Bass Highway, the key freight link for ports and the agriculture, forestry and mining industries.

The Minister for Infrastructure and Transport, Michael Ferguson, said on 31 May that while the Bass Highway is a major freight artery, it is also a vital connection for family and friends in the communities of the North West Coast.

Simultaneously, he released a strategy to improve safety and improve travel time on the Bass Highway between Launceston and Devonport, stating, "The upgrades are part of our record investment in State roads and bridge program with \$2.2 billion committed over the next four years.

The Bass Highway Corridor Strategy - Launceston to Devonport identifies 66 potential improvements for the 91-kilometre section of the highway from Hadspen to the east of Port Sorell Road in Devonport. They have categorised these into short, medium and longer-term priorities by assessing the how each action contributes to the key strategic objectives of safety, efficiency and resilience.

Specific projects to the Latrobe Municipality include -

### **SHORT TERM**

- Resurface road pavement south of Conservatory Road
- Provide suitable bus stop infrastructure in Sassafras
- Upgrade the Bass Highway intersection with Chapel Road Intersection
- Extend the existing northbound overtaking lane north of Conservatory Road
- Provide a northbound overtaking lane between East Sassafras Road and Oppenheims Road (uphill) with a safety barrier located in the central median to separate opposing traffic
- Improve side street access arrangements onto the highway between Henry Street and Abeys Road
- Resurface the road pavement north of Moriarty Road

### **MEDIUM TERM**

- Consolidate/remove direct accesses onto the highway north of Conservatory Road and Sassafras
- Provide a southbound overtaking lane in a suitable location within zone 9 with a safety barrier in the median to separate

- opposing traffic
- Consider providing a northbound overtaking lane in a suitable location within zone 9 with a safety barrier in the central median to separate opposing traffic
- Upgrade the Bass Highway intersection with East Sassafras / **Cutting Road**
- Upgrade the Bass Highway intersection with Oppenheims Road
- Provide a new southbound class 3/4 heavy vehicle driver rest area at Sassafras southbound service station
- Improve access to the service station in Latrobe
- Upgrade the Bass Highway intersection with Moriarty Road and consider a grade-separated intersection with a pedestrian crossing
- Consolidate/remove the direct accesses onto the highway north of Moriarty Road
- Provide noise attenuation through Latrobe Road
- Provide a southbound overtaking lane between Moriarty Road and Port Sorell Road with a safety barrier located in the median to separate opposing traffic
- Upgrade the existing visitor information bay west of Port Sorell Road to be a class 3/4 heavy vehicle driver rest area
- Duplicate the highway from Long Hill Road to Conservatory Road (Zone 8)

### **LONG TERM**

- Duplicate the highway from Conservatory Road to Sassafras
- Consolidate/remove the direct accesses onto the highway between Sassafras and Latrobe
- Duplicate the highway from Sassafras to Latrobe (Zone 10)
- Consider a Latrobe Bypass from Abeys Road to Port Sorell Road (Zone 11)

The reference to Zones relates to specific sections along the Bass Highway Corridor from Launceston to Latrobe.

#### **MEALS ON WHEELS**

Meals on Wheels delivers meals direct to homes from Monday to Friday to those unable to cook or shop for themselves or living with an illness or disability. This service plays a vital role in early intervention and health prevention, allowing older Australians to live in their homes where they are often happiest.

There is a cost for these meals however many of their customers receive support through Government funded programs, including the Commonwealth Home Support Program (CHSP), Home Care Packages (HCP), the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) and on a private non-subsidised basis.

#### **DEALING OUT JOY**

Meet Carleen Breaden and Dorothy (Dot) Payne, who make a difference in the lives of older people every week.

They're volunteers at Uniting AgeWell Latrobe Community, Strathdevon, and both run card games with residents on Tuesday mornings and bingo on Friday mornings. They've been volunteering at the not-for-profit aged care facility for the last five years and say they both feel like they've got a winning hand in getting as much joy from the experience as they give.

The great-grandmothers live close to each other and within walking distance of Strathdevon, and after the Tuesday session go for lunch, have coffee and chat about everything under the sun.

"Volunteering adds huge purpose to retirement," says Carleen, who worked in

the Manchester section of Kmart in Burnie for 27 years. "It's wonderful to be able to make a difference."

Dot agrees. She started volunteering at the site when a resident asked whether she would mind wheeling him in his chair to the bakery nearby. She did and the rest is history. Dot still takes residents to the bakery when the weather is good.

"It's wonderful to make a difference," says Dot, who used to drive the school bus for many years.

### 107,983 SCAMS IN FOUR MONTHS! TIPS ON HOW NOT TO BE CAUGHT

In the first four months of this year, Australians have reported 107,983 scams with an associated financial loss of \$194,133,494. Being scammed is an awful experience and can happen to anyone. The most common form of scams is for investment, followed by false billing, jobs and employment, phishing, dating and romance, remote access scams, threats to life, identity theft, rebate scams and classified scams.

Scammers are seeking your personal data - your name, address, date of birth, bank details and passwords - most of which you probably share regularly.

With this information or a combination of it, scammers can impersonate you and do all that you can, i.e., take out loans, sell property, create debt, etc.

To gain this information, scammers will -

- try to **gain your trust** by claiming to be from a well-known business or impersonating a known contact;
- will suggest their own verification procedures, like going to websites that they have created or calling numbers they provide to you
- · know how to appeal to your emotions and
- create a sense of urgency to get you to make decisions without thinking.

You can protect your personal information by following the following steps -

- 1. Shred personal documents before throwing them away
- 2. Be careful about the information you share on social media
- 3. Make sure that the person you are dealing with is who they say they are
- 4. Beware of anyone requesting your personal data or money,

- whether over the phone, via email or online. They may pretend to be a romantic interest, a family member in trouble or even a foreign prince.
- 5. Start taking a closer look at things. Scammers use legitimate-looking emails, letters and websites to trick you into handing over your personal data.
- 6. If you think that something is a scam, it probably is, so don't respond. Block and delete the email, throw out the letter, shut the door or hang up and block the phone number.
- 7. If you are unsure if it is a scam, use the phone book or an online search to get the organisation's contact details and check with them.
- 8. Install security software on all your electronic devices and make sure it is up to date.
- 9. Choose your passwords carefully. They are the best defence against data theft, so make sure they are strong and do not use the same password for every account, profile or wifi network.

If you have been caught up in a scam, report it to the Australian Government via Scamwatch (https://www.scamwatch.gov.au) and Report Cyber (https://reportapp.cyber.gov.au).

If you have been caught by a scam once, there is a strong likelihood of being caught in a follow-up scam, so be extra cautious and take action to minimise being targeted. Your service providers may be able to provide additional advice, i.e. if it involves your bank account, your bank may have specific guidance. Change the passwords of any online accounts or services that have been accessed.

Finally, seek support. Being a victim of fraud or a scam can impact your health.

- the full interest costs of a loan of up to \$10,000 over the first three years, and
- a five-percentage point interest subsidy for loan amounts over \$10,000 and less than \$60,000 over the first three years.
