# WASTE MANAGEMENT TAKES A GREEN TURN

Tasmania's waste management is undergoing a significant transformation

with the construction of the state's largest composting facility by Dulverton Waste Management. This facility will allow for more efficient and cost-effective disposal of organic waste, including food and garden waste from residential areas, and assists with extending the

landfill lifespan. Additionally, the composted product serves as a valuable resource for gardens and agriculture. To encourage better waste management practices throughout Tasmania, the Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) implemented a landfill waste levy in 2022-23. As an added incentive, they will also waive the fee for any waste diverted from landfill.

These factors have encouraged Latrobe Council to reconsider the benefits of a Food Organics, Garden Organics (FOGO) collection.

The Cradle Coast Waste Management Group, with Latrobe Council as a member, has facilitated the tender process for a

FOGO service to assist northwest councils in making an informed decision.



Consequently, a FOGO service is set to be nominally implemented on 1 July 2024 for all tenements currently receiving a kerbside waste service (garbage and recycling)

throughout the Latrobe Council area. While reduced compared to previous costings, there will be a fee for this service.

Latrobe Council will also collaborate with other North West Councils and the Cradle Coast Waste Management Group to maximize education opportunities and streamline the implementation process. Overall, Tasmania's push towards the FOGO service represents a significant step forward in sustainable waste management practices. By diverting organic waste from landfills and promoting composting, the state aims to reduce its environmental impact and create a greener future for all residents.

#### LIVE STREAMING ENHANCES COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

To further foster transparency and enhance public engagement, the Council has commenced live streaming its monthly general meetings through Microsoft Teams, supplementing its existing, publicly available audio recordings. This move comes as part of the Council's commitment to provide accessible and inclusive governance and a true representation of its activities. Residents will have the opportunity to witness council discussions and decisions in real time from the comfort of their homes. This technology addition ensures that individuals, who may not have been able to attend physically due to various reasons, can actively participate in civic affairs.

### **GROUND BREAKING INNOVATION EARNS STATE AWARD**

BridgePro Engineering Pty Ltd and Latrobe Council have been recognised for outstanding achievement in the construction of Australia's longest pedestrian bridge over the Mersey River. The project not only provides a safe and convenient passage for pedestrians but also links the Wild Mersey Mountain Bike Trails.



The Tasmanian Civil Contractors Federation (CCF) Earth Awards acknowledged the engineering prowess of BridgePro and the collaborative efforts of Latrobe Council in bringing this project to life. The 98+ kilometres of mixed-landscape riding that the bridge facilitates opens an array of possibilities for exploring three stunning locations, making it a significant addition to the region's adventure tourism.

While the completion of the bridge was met with anticipation and excitement, the community has faced disappointment as access to this architectural marvel has been hindered due to prolonged government official requirements. However, there is a glimmer of hope on the horizon, as recent concessions by those authorities are set to make the bridge publicly accessible at long last. Access to the pedestrian bridge will undoubtedly unlock the full potential of the Wild Mersey Mountain Bike Trails and cement its status as a must-visit destination for tourists and locals alike to experience the breathtaking views of the Mersey River and the surrounding landscapes.

This achievement is a testament to the possibilities that arise when innovative engineering and visionary urban planning come together.

#### TREE PLANTING DAY

Plant Ark's National Tree Day in July promotes environmental awareness and actioning community tree plantings around Australia.

Latrobe Council again continued its partnership with local primary schools by providing trees for them to plant. These trees empower students to recognise the pivotal role played by the Council in preserving green spaces while fostering a sense of responsibility and engagement among the young generation, inspiring them to actively contribute to enhancing their surroundings.

Geneva students (pictured) have engaged with National Tree Day for over two decades in planting trees at their Latrobe school premises or their outdoor education campus at Interlaken.



"The donation of trees from the Latrobe Council and other participating organisations enables us to plant unique and mature trees for the generations to come and creates a whole community focus on establishing trees and green zones for everyone to enjoy," said Mrs Rosemary Lincolne of Geneva.

#### LOCAL BUILDING UPDATE

29 applications comprising of 6 dwellings; 1 dwellings addition/alteration, 5 outbuildings; 13 plumbing applications and 4 other applications were received by Council in June inclusive with a conservative value of \$4,341,432.

#### **HAWLEY PATHWAY UPDATE**

Council's update in January advised that the development application for the Hawley Esplanade Pathway proposal had been submitted to Parks and Wildlife for their consent to lodge, which would have commenced the statutory assessment process under the Planning Scheme and the Land Use Planning and Approvals Act 1993. The application documentation was drafted based on the Latrobe Interim Planning Scheme 2013.

Unfortunately, by the time Council received consent to lodge the new Tasmanian Planning Scheme - Latrobe became effective, and the application had to be reworked to reflect the requirements of the new scheme. At the time of writing, this work has been completed and the application has been resubmitted to Parks and Wildlife for their consent to lodge. As soon as the consent is received the application will be lodged with Council's planning department and it will proceed through the statutory planning process. When the Development Application (DA) is advertised there will be an opportunity for the community to submit representations relevant to the requirements of the planning scheme either in support of or against the proposal. For transparency, the DA will be assessed by an external planning consultant who will make recommendations as to whether the application meets the requirements of the planning scheme. The Council, sitting as a planning authority, will then consider the recommendation and make a determination.

Due to the delay in receiving required approvals, the Council has committed \$300,000 in their 2023-24 capital works budget, with the balance to be allocated in 2024-25 to enable the completion of the project.

# OPEN SPACE, SPORT AND RECREATION PLANNING

Latrobe Council is in the final stages of developing a draft strategy to guide the planning and management of the municipality's open space network for the next decade. The Open Space, Sport, and Recreation Plan aims to enhance the maintenance and sustainability of grounds and facilities while ensuring their equitable distribution and accessibility to the community, promoting a vibrant and liveable environment.

The plan is also focused on identifying suitable locations for shared pathways, promoting active transportation and connectivity throughout the area, and designing a suite of park furniture to enhance comfort.

Council values the importance of public engagement in shaping the Open Space, Sport, and Recreation Plan, fostering a sense of ownership and alignment with the community's needs. Council will seek to further engage on the draft strategy in coming months, ensuring that a dynamic and sustainable open space network enriching the lives of all residents for years to come is developed as the final report considered by the Council.

#### **NEW FOOD VAN POLICY**

Council considered the establishment of a mobile food vending policy and is currently seeking public input on the proposal.

The new policy seeks to licence mobile food vans to trade at specific sites and times.

In consideration of competition with permanent food businesses, contemplation is being given as to whether to continue to require applicants to obtain a letter of agreement from a competing food business if within 200m of them.

### REIMAGINING THE LATROBE TOWN CENTRE

The Latrobe Council, in collaboration with businesses and the local community, is embarking on an ambitious endeavour to revamp the Latrobe Town Centre, bounded by Cotton Street, Victor Street, Hicks Lane, and Hamilton Street. The town has experienced significant growth, leading to a bustling town centre that requires a comprehensive review of its operations.

The unique layout of the Latrobe township, with the town centre stretching linearly away from the residential area, presents both challenges and opportunities for future development. The retail spaces are nearly at capacity, but a strategic plan for further commercial growth is lacking. Moreover, the town faces a shortage of visitor accommodation, limiting its potential as a tourism hub. To address these issues, the Council aims to reassess the core centre's design and attractiveness to residents and visitors. Key objectives include investigating opportunities for additional commercial

development and tourist accommodations, evaluating traffic flow and pedestrian accessibility along Gilbert Street, and proposing effective traffic management solutions.

The project will also address the town's parking situation, seeking to develop feasible solutions for future car parking while enhancing urban amenity. Public spaces like Station Square and

Kings Park will be reviewed for potential improvements and better connectivity to the coastal pathway along River Road and the Wild Mersey Mountain Bike Trailhead at Warrawee. The project seeks to enhance overall connectivity within the town centre and will develop a proposed structure plan to guide future growth and development effectively. Notably, a new site for a

market space will be identified to bolster local business and create a vibrant community gathering spot. The Council's ownership of the property containing the former Glee Club and land behind Morses Butchery presents a unique opportunity for their future integration into a cohesive master plan.

The project will be executed in three stages: a major community engagement process in October 2023, a round of public engagement after the draft Outcomes

Presentation/Report and briefing in January 2024, and the final Outcomes Presentation/Report expected by April 2024. #### FIRIES STAIR CLIMB

On 2 September, the Melbourne Firefighter Stair Climb will stage its 10th stair climb.

The Melbourne Firefighter Stair Climb is held in memory of those who lost their lives in the twin towers terrorist attacks on 11 September 2001, and survivors of the day who are now having emerging health problems from the day.

Specifically, it provides an opportunity to raise awareness and funds for cancer research through the Peter McCallum Foundation, and mental health and suicide prevention through Lifeline.

The challenge invites 700 Emergency Services personnel from across Australia to don 25 kilograms of turnout gear including breathing apparatus, which increases the body temperature to 80 degrees, to then climb 28 flights of stairs of the Crown Metropol Hotel. It's hot, hard, personal and extremely rewarding. Three members from the Port Sorell Fire Brigade are participating again this year - Craig, Lexie and Jack.

"We are unique as we are visitors to the event, we finance our flights and accommodation, and give of our time whilst we train and attend the event.


We have been blown away by the curiosity and generosity of our community in general," said Craig. "We cannot wait to give it another go."

### SPEED REDUCED ALONG SQUEAKING POINT ROAD

Over the last few years Council has received an increasing number of concerns about the appropriateness of the existing 100 km/h speed limit on Squeaking Point Rd, Thirlstane. These mostly relate to driver behaviour, the number of crashes, the resulting property damage, and potential for injury. It has also been suggested that when the Department of State Growth changed the speed limit on Port Sorell Main Road to 80km/h this inadvertently resulted in additional use of Squeaking Point Road as motorists tried to get to their destination quicker. Council does not initiate changes to speed limits lightly, but an assessment of the road's alignment, width, traffic volumes, mixed-use, speed differences, concealed accesses, and crash history has led to the Commissioner for Transport approving a speed reduction to 80km/h for the 1.3km section between Frankford Road and Appleby Road. Within this section, there will remain corner advisory speeds less than the lowered speed limit, however, the speed differential between the advisory speed and posted speed limit will be much closer.

Motorists are urged to adhere to the revised speed limit that fosters a safer and more secure driving environment for everyone on Squeaking Point Road.

### LATROBE FLOOD MITIGATION UPDATE

The partnership between BridgePro Engineering Pty Ltd and Latrobe Council in the ambitious Flood Mitigation Project is yielding significant progress, bringing the community one step closer to enhanced flood protection and safety. This project aims to fortify the town of Latrobe against the devastating impact of floods, safeguarding lives, properties, and livelihoods. The reinstatement of the revered Sheean Memorial, preserving its historical significance, has been reopened to the public, allowing residents and visitors to pay their respects once again. Furthermore, Station Square carpark, the laneway between Subway and the Newsagents, and Kobie Lane have all been sealed and reopened. These improvements not only enhance the aesthetics of the area but also alleviate traffic congestion and provide a more convenient experience for businesses and visitors. The completion of the diversion culvert and inlet works is a substantial achievement in the project. These installations are designed to regulate water flow during heavy rainfall, minimising the risk of flooding in vulnerable areas and channelling excess water away from residential and commercial zones. **Ongoing Works and Upcoming Milestones:** While several milestones have been accomplished, work

While several milestones have been accomplished, work continues on the Kings Creek Levee. With this component of the flood mitigation project still under construction, walking tracks in

its vicinity remains closed to the public for safety reasons. Once finished, the Kings Creek Levee will bolster the region's resilience against floods, providing additional protection to nearby areas.

The River Road earth levee works have been successfully completed, laying the foundation for improved flood defences. However, concreting, sealing, and final finishing works are scheduled to be finalised in October, subject to weather conditions.

Another crucial achievement is the completion of the Atkinson Park Levee. While the levee is complete, final touches and adjustments are underway and expected to be concluded in October.

Presently, BridgePro Engineering is constructing the Pump Station and levee wall in the parkland between the pigeon club and Miles Ford Bridge. The ongoing works in this area have necessitated its temporary closure to the public. These efforts are slated for completion towards the end of October.

As the project advances, the collaboration between BridgePro Engineering Pty Ltd and Latrobe Council continues to demonstrate a commitment to the welfare and safety of the community and the town of Latrobe moving closer to a future that is better prepared to face the challenges posed by natural disasters.

#### 100 YEARS OF CEMENT AUSTRALIA

In 2023 Cement Australia is celebrating 100 years of production at the Railton plant. Tasmanian Cement Pty Ltd was formed in 1922 at Railton with the clearing of the site and construction of the plant commencing that year and production commencing in 1923.

The need for more capital to fund the ongoing operation of the plant and the expansion required to meet demand prompted the move to form a new company. On 31 July 1928, Goliath Portland Cement Company Limited was formed.

In September 1989 the Goliath Board accepted an offer from Australian Cement Ltd (jointly owned by CSR and Pioneer) and Goliath was acquired by Australian Cement Holdings (ACH).

Through the 1990s and into the new millennium there was a high demand for product with the 2000 Olympics in Sydney however with the threat of imports and the pressure on costs the amalgamation of QCL & ACH went ahead in 2003 forming Cement Australia and became the largest cement manufacturing company in Australia.

The plant has had multiple upgrades throughout its life and continues to be a world-class operation today.

Cement Australia will be presenting a public display of its history through the decades at Kings Hall in Railton from 2-6 October 9:00 am to 4:00 pm daily which includes the shale oil operation at Latrobe that played a significant part in the formation of a cement works at Railton.

### BALANCING DOG FREEDOM AND RESPONSIBLE OWNERSHIP

Latrobe Council has determined a number of off-leash areas to provide dogs with a chance to stretch their legs, enjoy some free play, and interact with other furry friends. These designated spaces not only benefit dogs but also have a positive impact on the mental health and physical well-being of their owners. Regular exercise in these areas has been shown to reduce nuisance behaviour in dogs, such as excessive barking, digging, and destructive outbursts.

However, it's essential to recognise that not all people like dogs or feel comfortable around them. As responsible dog owners, we should be considerate of others while using these off-leash areas. Here are some simple rules to follow to ensure a safe and pleasant experience for everyone:

- Leash Up: Always leash your dog before entering and upon leaving the off-leash area. This helps ensure a controlled and safe transition for your dog.
- Proper Identification: Make sure your dog wears an appropriately fitted collar, harness, or halter with a current Council registration tag attached. This ensures that your dog can be easily identified and returned to you if lost.
- Clean Up After Your Dog:
   Respect other park users by promptly cleaning up after your dog and appropriately disposing of the waste not in the nearest front garden.
- Respect Signs and Boundaries:
   Comply with all signs and boundaries in the off-leash area.
   Always carry a leash with you and be prepared to use it if your dog exhibits aggressive behaviour.
- Anti-Social Behaviour: Your dog should not harass, intimidate, or behave aggressively toward people or other animals. Be aware of your dog's interactions and intervene if necessary.
- No Jumping on People: Some people may not be comfortable around dogs, so prevent your dog from jumping up on others. This will ensure a positive experience for everyone.
- Effective Control: Your dog must always be under your effective control. This means your dog must respond to your commands and always return to you when called.

- Supervise Your Dog: As a responsible owner, actively supervise your dog and maintain an unobstructed view of them throughout their off-leash time.
- Aggressive Behaviour: If your dog displays aggressive behaviour towards people or other animals, leash them immediately and remove them from the off-leash area.

By following these guidelines, we can create a harmonious environment in off-leash areas, where dogs can have fun, and owners can enjoy the benefits of a well-exercised and well-behaved pet. It's a collective effort to ensure the safety and enjoyment of everyone in the community, including those who may not be as fond of dogs. So, let's be responsible, respectful, and make the most of these wonderful off-leash spaces!

#### **AVOID ENFORCEMENT**

Council reminds dog owners that the current year's dog registrations were due to be paid by 31 July 2023. We understand that life gets busy, and you may have overlooked paying for your dog for the current financial year, which can lead to potential enforcement actions and on-the-spot fines.

If you have misplaced or didn't receive your original renewal notice, please contact Council to discuss. Dog owners who have not renewed their dog registration are required to:

- Ensure that all dogs under your ownership or responsibility are registered; or
- If the dog has changed owner, left the area, or is now deceased please notify Council. The Dog Control Act, 2000 stipulates this must be in writing.

To avoid enforcement action and/or on-the-spot fines, please contact the Council to register your dog or ensure your animal's information is up to date
